Arniel Frialde, the '92 Co-Champion, led the field by an impressive 1.5 points. Arnie's official qualification route was winning the '93 Northern Alberta Open. Greg Huber ('92 Co-Champion with Frialde) and Arthur Odachowski tied for 2nd-3rd at 5-2, another 1.5-point gap ahead of the 4th-6th place finishers at 3.5-3.5, Dale Haessel (Alberta Open winner), Farzan Nazarian, and Rob Gardner. The lowest-rated entrants found it tough going: Christiaan Dartana (qualified through the Edmonton Closed, in which he was 2nd) finished at 1 point, and Jim Daniluk couldn't take any points.

The Alberta Closed was held over the Easter weekend in Calgary. Here are the round-by-round results and the game scores:



Community Outreach Chess Challenge Continued for 1993

In 1992 the ACA instituted the "Community Outreach Chess Challenge / Education" project and received a \$2000 RPW Grant from the Alberta Government for it. The project included hosting amateur (unrated) tournaments in three rural communities to promote chess and to help out the local chess club. The tournaments were to have free entry and be restricted to unrated/ low-rated players. The aim was to provide chess players in rural Alberta with a chance to play in an organized competitive tournament against other local players.

Unfortunately, in 1992 this project never really got underway. Of the \$2000 grant, we spent only \$400 (for a simul in Medicine Hat). The Education portion had only one request—unfortunately, the ACA was unable to find someone to do the teaching.

The ACA Board of Directors still considers this project viable and will continue the tournament aspect in 1993, dropping the education part. We will host amateur tournaments in Lethbridge, Grande Prairie, and possibly Athabasca. The RPW Foundation has allowed the funds remaining from the 1992 grant to be used to complete the project.

Time for Chess

In 1993 the ACA will help six of Alberta's major chess clubs with the "Time For Chess" project, providing some badly needed chess clocks to help alleviate the shortage of working clocks (these clocks will be available for ACA events, too).

The clocks are funded by a \$2000 RPW Foundation Grant (Alberta Government).

Forty-five Jerger Tournament clocks will be available for distribution amongst the six chess clubs. Clubs should be receiving their new clocks in the next few months.

Write Your MLA, Premier Ralph, and/or Dianne Mirosh

The Alberta Government is trying to reduce the deficit by cutting spending. This may involve reducing funding available to recreation and sports groups (the amount of money given is very small compared to other government expenditure areas).

The ACA, along with 106 other recreation and sports organizations, receives much of its funding from an annual grant from Alberta Parks and Recreation. This funding helps pay for many programs we provide to chess players throughout Alberta each year, such as tournament room rental, representation at national championships, championship tournaments, the Alberta Chess Report, etc. Government support allows us to keep membership fees low and tournament costs down-without it, the ACA would not be able to provide all the programs which it currently does. In addition to base level funding to recreation/sports organizations, the Alberta Government also provides funding via the RPW Foundation—this support allows organizations to do things beyond their normal scope.

If you feel funding to recreation organizations such as the ACA has been very worthwhile, why not write to your MLA, Premier Ralph, and/or Dianne Mirosh (Community Development Minister) to let them know this support has been appreciated, and has added to the quality of life of Albertans. This may help persuade our government representatives to give a second thought to reduction of funding for recreation and sport organizations when it comes to finding places to cut back on spending.

Calgary Chess Club Championship by Jim Daniluk, TD

The Calgary CC Championship was held Nov. 3 - Dec. 15 and was won easily by Dale Haessel with a perfect 7-0 score. Dale has been very impressive since his return from school in B.C.

Good results were obtained by Farzan Nazarian (5.5) and Wilf Lahrkamp (5). Jim Van Wyck and Ben Vandermeer shared top 1700-1999 with 3.5 points. Ben's result is particularly notable after a 0-2 start.

Top 1400-1699 was won by Tim McMurphy (3.5), and Top Unrated by newcomers Rodney Weis and Pierre Charland at 2 points.

Calgary January Open by Barney Fegyverneki, TD

After losing in round 1 in a stunning upset to "Wild Bill" Rusk, who was rated 700 rating points lower, Dale Haessel regained his form to tie for 1st with Ben Vandermeer. Jim Daniluk and Max Carcamo split 3rd-4th.

Paul Montambault, from Edmonton, took the Top Under 1600 prize. Although Bill Rusk couldn't pull another rabbit out of his chess hat, he still shared second Under 1600 with Lee Nagle.

Amanda Dodd-Flower took the top honours in the Under 1400 section.

Colossal Calgary Closed by Greg Huber, TD

The '93 Calgary Closed was quite a success in number and in strength of participants. The top two sections were 8-player round robins, and the 3rd a 12-player Swiss.


The top section's average rating was impressive (slightly above 2100). Dale Haessel emerged with 5/7 to take first, half a point ahead of Ted Wilson and Arthur Odachowski. Each of the three played solidly, losing only 1 game each. The hapless TD took 5 rounds to get over his long chesslayoff and convince himself that, no, chess positions can't be solved with transistor n-p-n junction equations...

Section II was an extremely hard fought struggle, with no less than three (!) co-champions emerging. Paul Usselman edged out Max Carcamo and Bill Bentley on tiebreak, each with 5/7. Not surprisingly, these three were 1.5 points ahead of the field.

Despite losing his first game (accelerated Swiss gambit?), Bill Rusk fought back and took first in Section III with an impressive 6/7. Jeff Rouse (5/7), motivated by some unspecified 'fringe benefits' to play well in the later rounds, held on to 2nd. Dave Gomboc and Lee Nagle each had 4/7, taking 3rd and top under 1500, respectively.

92-93 Alta-B.C. Peace River Grand Prix by Jim Kanester

Another successful chess season wrapped up March 27 in Grande Prairie at the Swan City Open (Grant MacTavish was clear first with 3.5 points in both the Mukluk Open, ahead of F. Nelson at 3, and the Swan City, ahead of B. Waldie at 3 — ed.). The overall Grand Prix winner for the 3rd year in a row was Grant MacTavish of Dawson Creek, who was presented with the Jim Williams Memorial trophy. Grant is now very close to an expert rating as a result of his successful seasons.

Larry Stutzman of Ft. St. John was second and the only player who came close to Grant's Grand Prix score.

The novice class (under 1700) was won by Gordon MacDonald of Dawson Creek, with Brian Waldie of D.C. a close second.

Although the competition was keen, with an expert and a master playing in our tournaments this year and with many strong B and A class players coming out of our events, the average turnout was down to 9 this year, partly due to the Ft. St. John club's low participation and partly due to conflicts with players' schedules.

Our Grand Prix events now are so competitive that we are adding a third section, under 1400 rating, to the prizes to encourage participation of casual and beginning players.

Next year, which is our 10th Anniversary year, we will have a guaranteed prize fund to further encourage travel between our cities.

The move played tempts White to go into bad lines like 12.Nxb8 dxc4. 12.Qxd5!? Nd6 13.Nxb4!? After the previous moves, White is committed to this (and maybe should be committed in another sense, too ...). 13... Bxd5 14.Bxd5 So White's down a queen for a knight and a pawn. He's very active, though. and threatens to win back more material. 14...Ra7 Also interesting is 14...a5. 15.Bb6 Qd7 16.Nc5 Qb5 17.Bxa7 Qxb4 18.c4? I had to think for a long time to talk myself out of the obvious 18.c3 and into this lemon. After 18.c3 Qa5 19.b4 Qc7 20.Bxb8 Qxb8 White can try 21 Nxa6 Qb6 22 Nc5 e6 23 .Bf3 which, frankly, doesn't inspire confidence.

ALBERTA JUNIOR CHESS REPORT



(A special section of the Alberta Chess Report, April 1993)

The 1993 Canadian Cadet by Beatrice Wu

The 1993 Canadian Cadet took place March 15-19 in Nanaimo, B.C. My mom and I arrived on Sunday early afternoon, just in time. Due to fog, ours was the last flight to get in. Fog delayed the arrival of some other players, but by nightfall everyone had arrived except Radu (Ontario), so at the last minute Alfred Pechisker was called and there were now 4 B.C. players.

The winner, with 8.5 points, was Umadesan Casinathan (Ontario), who narrowly bested Ian Martinovsky (B.C.) by 1/2 point. Ian in turn was 1/2 point ahead of the 3rd place finisher Anthony Castillo (Québec).

I didn't play as well as I'd wanted, being terribly inconsistent and at times playing plain horrible. I did manage to play some good games but, of my best games, there was none that I could win or even draw. I ended up with 1.5 points (3 draws), tying for 8th-10th with Alfred Pechisker and Neil Collins.

It was unfortunate that I started off the tournament slow because during the first few rounds I was scheduled to play opponents within my winning/drawing range. By the time I finally got going, I was playing the likes of Castillo, Casinathan and Martinovsky. In the first round I drew Alfred, a fellow 1600. The second round game was perhaps my worst of the tournament. As White against Peter Marshall's Sicilian I played c3 and secured quite a nice position from the opening, having a space advantage and an isolated central pawn and pinned knight to attack. But then I committed a series of four gross blunders which resulted in the complete infiltration of my queenside and my king stranded in the center. I didn't last long. The next day I played Joel Donen (Saskatchewan) and Neil Collins (New Brunswick). I accepted a draw with Neil, which I now feel that I shouldn't have, but the game had already taken 5 hours and I wasn't feeling particularly energetic confronted with the complicated endgame that would follow. From this point my overall play got better, but unfortunately it didn't do me much good points wise. I played well in round 5 and secured a drawish opposite colored bishop ending. If you think such endings can't be lost, think again because I proceeded to get my knight pinned off and it was all over. Analyzing the game I discovered I'd missed several strong lines which may have led to wins. It was a Ruy Lopez

Marshall gambit which I declined—at the time I didn't know what it was and the way I declined seemed to have confused Anthony, or so he said after the game. In the following two rounds against Uma and Ian I was smashed. Both games were very instructional though. In round 8 I played Andrew Ho and this was my third missed opportunity. By now I really wanted some points and I think I played well, once again obtaining a normally drawn ending, but again blundered and allowed him to queen a pawn.

At this point the race for first was clearly between Ian, Uma, and Anthony. Ian was in the lead undefeated, but had to face Uma in the last round. Ian seemed in a better position though, because Uma still had an exceedingly drawish adjournment with Alfred, and in the 7th round Umahad also drawn Anthony while Ian defeated Anthony in round 8.

Round 9 was the deciding round, in three aspects. It would decide who would become the 1993 Canadian Cadet Champion, it would decide whether Joel or Mark or both would place fourth, and it was also important for me as it would decide whether I remained in sole last place with 1 point or would catch Neil and Alfred who currently had 1.5. I was White against Mark Marcil from Nanaimo. and our billet's next door neighbour. I played the Stonewall, an out-of-date opening which was rather faulty, but which I felt was fun to play and it was possible to mount an unstoppable attack with it. Naturally, Mark played it correctly, upsetting the natural order of the opening (which is, of course, why it's faulty) and went on the offensive. Somehow though, his attack never got through, probably because I had firm control of the center, and the game eventually petered out into a draw. Finally I had managed to draw a higher-rated player and at least I wasn't clear last. Mark's draw with me also allowed Joel to clinch clear fourth with 4.5 points. What would have been a monumental game between Uma and Ian wasn't really that monumental-Ian had a temporary case of blindness and dropped the exchange on move 20. So Uma won the tournament.

So much for the official stuff. My mom and I stayed with very nice billets, the Pilkonis family. Mrs. Pilkonis was a very good cook and delighted in stuffing us with rich food. She and my mom probably traded a lot of recipes during that week. I had a mild disaster on the second day. Our lunches for every day except Friday were donated by various local restaurants and Tuesday's was supposed to

be pizza, but their oven broke down, so Mr. Marcil, the tournament organizer, drove us down to McDonald's. There I sprayed Neil Collins, my next opponent, thoroughly with coke—an interesting (and embarrassing) accident. Luckily (unluckily?) he had on a waterproof jacket. Another behind-the-official-scenes incident was the solemn vowing of Peter Marshall and some others to never eat another donut. Tim Horton's was one of the food donators and, with nothing better to do between rounds, the average rate of consumption of donuts was 10 to 15 a day each.

On Friday afternoon a simultaneous exhibition by Jonathan Berry, the TD, involved several orangutans, and a Bird's opening against Joel. It didn't work very well as there were too many good players and many draws were agreed upon before we got kicked out of the mall (the area was rented for only 3 hours). On Saturday starting at noon was an open blitz tournament, also at the mall. An unfortunate misunderstanding resulted in Anthony nearly being abandoned at his billet's house (he thought we would take him but we thought he knew we were going shopping early Saturday morning). He did manage to get there, whereupon I drew him in a mad time scramble where I was one move from being mated and his flag fell. The blitz tournament was much fun and I got a decent score of 7.5 out of 12, winning \$10 even though I didn't make the playoffs. The awards banquet on Saturday night was interesting, but the "Chinese" food was horrible. Everyone got various prizes and socks (never forget the socks!) which poked fun at each player's unique attributes, such as the player with the neatest score sheet or the biggest consumer of the donated drinks. Ian Martinovsky won the brilliancy prize.

Though I was slightly disappointed with my play, I found the Canadian Cadet to be a wonderful experience. Most of the time it was enjoyable and, though I had to miss a week of school and was subsequently bombarded with homework upon my return, it was worthwhile. I learned a lot from my games, experienced a whole slough of interesting openings which were new to me, and got a glimpse of the nature of chess at the national level. Thanks to the ACA for providing airfare for my trip to Nanaimo, and to Cliff and Naseeb Marcil for doing a great job of organizing the tournament. Thanks also to Jonathan Berry for directing, thinking up those goofy prizes, and giving the simultaneous at the end (it was fun, really). Special

thanks to the Pilkonis family, who gave me lots of support, drove me everywhere (they even gave Anthony a ride when we left him behind), and provided wonderful accommodations for my mom and I.

There were more playoff games than rounds in the regular tournament!

Along with the third record turnout in a row (18 players), the appearance of five of Edmonton's top-ranked Cadets promised this assault would have high casualties. Play was fast and furious, with no prisoners taken.
