As a Christmas treat for a Junior Friday Night session, Chess Master Vicente Lee played a simultaneous at Edmonton Chess Club against 25 juniors with many parents serving as spectators.

Lee's perfect score, 25-0, came somewhat as a surprise considering that there were a few promising juniors anxious to score a big win.

After the simul, he went on to explain the common mistakes that his opponents were making and suggested possible improvements.

The defeated juniors were surprisingly quiet and attentive during the Master's commentary, although they had been bursting with excitement a bit earlier as little Christmas treats were given out while Lee was

ACA directors sets budget amount for 2007

Alberta Chess Association's November meeting in Red Deer was very productive.

The officers and directors in attendance were Ford Wong, Ron Hinds, Micah Hughey, Vladislav Rekhson, Richard Pua, Robert Davies, Jim Daniluk, Greg Huber and Paul Viminitz.

During the drive to the meeting, Wong suggested that an award should be given to players who attend and support chess events outside their home community.

His "Road Warrior" idea is meant to promote higher attendance at ACA tournaments.

It would also reward players travelling to harder-toreach places in Alberta such as Grande Prairie, Lethbridge, and Medicine Hat.

It was ironic that the Wongmobile experienced a blown tire during the trip and the Edmonton directors were delayed by half an hour.

The board completed a list of tournaments for 2007. (See Page 6.)

The ACA is coordinating with other chess organizations in regards to scheduling, hoping it will reduce conflict between various tournaments and allow competitors a greater degree of flexibility in planning their chess trips.

The ACA has agreed in principle to pay all rating fees incurred in the province.

Currently, the ACA pays for all CFC rating fees of \$3 per player.

A request was made that Chess n' Math rating fees should also be paid by the ACA.

The board is now waiting for A.G.L.C. approval on this matter.

Tournament director (TD) honoraria could soon be paid for by casino funds.

Calgary Chess Club

received approval from A.G.L.C. that TD's can be paid with casino funds because "TD's possess skills that other chess players lack" which translates to a legitimate expense of running an event.

Alberta Chess Association and Edmonton Chess Club are pursuing approval for this type of use of casino funding.

"Honorariums constitute a large part of a chess club's regular account expenses and having casino funds offset this expense will be very nice indeed," said ACA Vice-President Micah Hughey.

The budget ceiling for the 2007 year was set at \$90,000. This motion was passed with four in favor, two against and two abstentions.

The ACA has plans to host a Canadian Open in 2008 in Calgary and to help sponsor the National Chess Challenge in Edmonton in 2008.

ACA casino may need more workers

The next Alberta Chess Association casino will be on Tuesday and Wednesday, January 9 and 10, at Yellowhead Casino, 12464 - 153 Street in Edmonton.

The ACA will be counting on its members to help volunteer at this casino. Anyone who can help is asked to contact ACA President Ford Wong, (780) 481-6474 or e-mail: fordie@ shaw.ca.

Currently the ACA would stand to raise roughly \$78,000 for a short 2 days work. However, with the opening of two new casinos in Edmonton, the amount is expected to be less.

Casino revenue has helped the ACA fund many of its projects including the Canadian Open 2005, and travel for many of our representatives to national events. These revenues also pay for rental of tournament sites and rating fees to the CFC.

Alberta Open 2006 on Thanksgiving weekend attracted 29 players from Edmonton, Calgary, Grande Prairie and Saskatchewan.

There were five masters and five experts competing despite the low turnout, considering previous Alberta Opens have attracted over 50 players.

Many of the titled players had additional incentive to compete because this tournament was a qualifier for the Alberta Closed 2007.

Winners in the Open section were Victor Kaminski and Martin Robichaud. Both Calgarians finished with 5 points out of a possible 6.

Greg Huber of Calgary finished in third with 4.5/6 score.

Lower sections

The Under 2100 section was won by Micah Hughey of Edmonton with 4.5/6 points.

Under 1800 section was split between Thomas Kaminski of Calgary and Keith MacKinnon of North Battleford, Saskatchewan, each with a 3.5/6 score.

The Under 1600 section was claimed by Chase Cunningham and Bronislav Swiecicki, each with a 3/6 score.

The tournament was full of suspense and upsets.

The Alberta masters were having a tough time against lower rated players in the early rounds.

Young Thomas Kaminski scored an upset win over Huber.

Jeff Reeve managed only a draw against



Although the Alberta chess scene may appear quiet, the ACA has been

very busy. Last year, the ACA sponsored the very successful (personal bias aside) Canadian Open 2005 in Edmonton. The next time the ACA

sponsors a major event, we hope to have it in Calgary to give our southern members an opportunity to be the home team.

In addition, to our "CORE" tournaments (the ACA hosts at least one weekend tournament every month), the ACA intends in 2007 to feature more titled players (Grandmasters, etc) in Alberta to provide lectures, simul events and to participate some of our tournaments. New to this year's tournament schedule was the "International Norm Tournament" on Easter weekend which gave many of our Alberta Masters a chance to earn a norm.

As in past years, the ACA will be "fully" sponsoring the travel of our champions to national events which included our 12 scholastic champions to the Canadian Chess Challenge Finals in Moncton, New Brunswick in May, our six champions to the Canadian Youth Chess Championship in Kitchener, Ontario in July, and our Alberta Closed Champion to the Canadian Closed in Toronto. Last

year, the ACA sponsored our Alberta Women's Champion, Cornelia Dinca, to the Canadian Women's Championship.

The ACA has also been actively helping many of the chess clubs in Alberta including the Calgary Chess Club and the Grande Prairie Chess Club. The ACA has been supplying clubs such as the Lethbridge Chess Club, Okotoks Chess Club, and the U of Calgary Chess Club with equipment. New clubs starting up this year include Banff led by Jonathan Day and Fort McMurray led by Jhonny Labrador.

Junior chess is growing greatly with the tireless work of Bruce Thomas and Roving ChessNuts with plans to provide chess education to schools in rural Alberta.

The ACA will be sponsoring its Public Library Initiative where the ACA will help put chess books in libraries throughout Alberta. Not to be missed will be the Giant Chess Set in Medicine Hat, a project led by Bill Taylor and the Medicine Hat Chess Club (I can only assume that this set is used by the guy who lives in the giant Tee Pee there).

CFC gives early Christmas present to players

For a number of years, a lot of chess players felt that there was a Chess Federation of Canada (CFC) rating deflation problem.

The argument was that under-rated junior players suck points from the lower boards in tournaments.

This then leads to less points being available to higher rated players when they beat lower-rated opponents of any age.

The CFC adjusted its rating system early in December.

The CFC has counted how many games a player has had rated from July 2004 to the present, and awarded bonus points for every game via the following formula:

Rating - Bonus Points 0 - 1999 -1 point per game 2000-2199 -

1/2 point per game 2200-2800 -

1/4 point per game The CFC rating committee is hoping that a lot of players receiving a higher rating through the bonus points will mean several things, including

juniors being able to earn higher ratings quicker and higher-rated players getting more points for their victories. The bonus is also rewarding players who participate in a lot of tournaments with the belief that more experience means more acquired knowledge of the game. **Three new Masters**

Micah Hughey of Edmonton, one of the country's most active players, experienced the highest rating gain by far among Albertans.

His new rating of 2296 would put him #6 on the Top 50 Albertans list.

Other notable players benefitting from the bonus are Eric Hansen of Calgary at 2203 and Vladislav Rekhson of Edmonton at 2201.

The bonus points have allowed these three players to become instant Masters although they will have to maintain their over 2200 rating over at least 25 games.

Only time will tell if this adjustment will really help juniors and reflect accurately, the relative strengths of players of all ages.

It will be interesting to see if some type of rating point feeding frenzy will occur in Alberta!

Westbrook Elementary continues to dominate Edmonton team events
