# Huber Wraps Up At Two Weekends Before Christmas Open

**EMPLOYS** HUBER GREG CONTACT FULL SOME TOBOGGANING AT THE TWO BEFORE WEEKENDS CHRISTMAS.

They say that tobogganing can be a dangerous sport and that when on the hill you must always be aware of others, especially those behind you. You never know when another toboggan might come your way and overtake you. You might say that, that was what happened to Jeff Reeve at the Two Weekends Before Christmas Tournament as he was literary run over by the Huber sled.

These were always the last games to finish for each round leaving Huber barely any time to get a bite to eat before starting the next round. On day two, round four saw Greg Huber converting a rook ending against Micah Hughey.

## NEW WINNER AT 8th ANNUAL MEDICINE HAT OPEN

Twelve players participated in this years This years Medicine Hat Open. competitors included five Edmontonians, two Calgarians, and five locals (including one junior. There were no Lethbridge players in attendance this year. I despair somewhat that there may no longer be any coherent organization of serious chess in Lethbridge, with the distant departure of Perhaps Graham Dr. Grant Brown. Sorgard can marshall the troops and reverse the "decline".

For the most part, Edmontonians have been faithful attendees of this tournament. John Quiring (aka "Mr. Big", and "Mr. Power") and Ford Wong ("Mr Digital Cameraman") led the troops which included Micah Hughey, Zhichao Li, and "The Rocket" (Rob Gardner). Chris Kucjaj (a 2-time champion) and (Kris Boehmer) a former champion were the Calgary representatives. In total, we had four former champions vying for the title this year. However, none of the former champions were to be ultimately victorious this year. This honour went to a new participant, Zhichao Li ("Leaf"). pelasant, quiet, This articulate, contemplative, university student went undefeated this year with a record of (4.5/5). Leaf seemed to convert (what appeared to me to be ) drawn positions into won games. He may have dodged a bullet in his last round game with Kris, but as of this moment, I haven't had time to review the game. Rob Gardner finished a solid second with (4/5), losing only to Leaf. Tied for third in the top section were Chris Kuczaj and Micah Hughey with (3/5). In the bottom section (consisting of 6 players), Adam Szulski (of Medicine Hat) was first with (3/5). Big John and myself were tied for second place with (2.5/5). As far as I know the biggest swindle of the tournament was my victory over Adam in round 2. Essentially I was dead lost for about 30 moves, but hung in there and slowly eked out a victory with the promotion of my C-pawn. Redemption of a sort occurred, as Adam won his next 3 games to finish first in the bottom section.



Alberta's top player Jeff Reeve went undefeated with four wins and two draws to clinch the victory.

Zhichao Li finished only half a point behind and will certainly gain some rating points. He played a lot of unorthodox openings, and outplayed most of his opponents in the endgame.

Paolo Veneracion got good positions in many games, but often could not find the crushing move to get the full point.
