#### **Edmonton Winter Open**

This December 19-20 event wasn't just the "weekend before Christmas tournament", but included a special Christmas treat: Mike Yip stopped by to use this tournament as a warm-up and got an early Xmas present by winning the Winter Open with 3-0-1 in this 4-round Swiss, playing 3 blacks and 1 white. The draw came at the hands of Cor Dewindt, Mike's dreaded arch enemy and one of the few people who doesn't fear him. The game was a good-B vs bad-B of same color ending, with Mike failing to obtain some penetration squares for his King. Said a disappointed Mike after the game: "I played like a YIP!".

With 25 players, an accelerated Swiss might have seemed best, but it was not done and proved unnecessary as a clear winner was determined in 4 rounds. In round 1, Beatrice Wu, newly crowned "Alberta Cadet Champion" upset 3rd-seeded Tracy Kolenchuk (Tracy had somewhat of a bad

weekend). Round 3 saw Adam Wu defeat Rob Gardner, when Rob laid back and invited Adam to get him and Adam obliged, using deflection as the theme for his mating attack. After 3 rounds, Adam Wu and Mike Yip emerged as the leaders and headed for a showdown in round 4. Mike showed good positional understanding, sacrificing the exchange against Adam, leading to the win.

Other tournament highlights include Eric Schocat's several attempts to disprove the theory that "bishops of opposite colors is a draw" in long "drawn" out endgames. However, he managed to be successful once when his opponent resigned prematurely.

Mike, after several years of living in the competitive chess-deprived Yellowknife, is taking time off from working to satisfy his chess-starved appetite for a chess tour, including visiting Hungary. Good luck Mike—if you make it big, remember the "Winter

Open" got you off to a good start, and don't forget to send us a postcard.

To those wanting to know what to study to improve their chess, Mike Yip said, stretching-out the phrase: 'ennn...spee...elll' (Ford's attempt at Mike's German for 'end game'—ed.)

#### **ACR Deadline**

Material for inclusion in the next ACR should be received by: March 12. Items received after that date may be delayed to a later ACR. (Up to 5 ACR's are published each year.)

#### **Reminder to Tournament Directors**

CFC regulations require a report to be submitted within 7 days of the end of an event. You owe it to your participants to send in rating and membership reports to the CFC as soon as possible. A written report should also be sent to the ACR (please support your Alberta newsletter too!).

#### Always Get a Receipt

When you pay for a CFC/ACA membership, be sure to get a dated receipt signed by the person who collected your money. Retain the receipt until your new CFC card arrives.

#### **NEWS FROM THE ACA**

#### ◆ ◆ ◆ ◆ Volunteers Urgently Needed for Calgary Casino ◆ ◆ • •

Volunteers are still needed to help with the ACA's 2-day casino to be hosted in Calgary during the period of July-September 1993. Before the ACA can successfully host a Casino, it must demonstrate that it can provide enough Volunteers to help out. All volunteers must be pre-registered several months in advance. January and February may be the last time to sign up. Signup lists have been posted at the Edmonton Chess Club and at the Calgary Chess Club. You can also register by phoning Paul Usselman at

270-0493 in Calgary or myself at 481-6474 in Edmonton. Time is running out and <u>NOW</u> is the time to sign up. Please sign up now, if you think that you may be able to help. Signing up does not mean you're fully committed—the date of the Casino may conflict with your schedule, etc. (the date will not be known until February 23rd). Ideally, 60 volunteers are needed and to date only 20 have been signed up! If the ACA is unable to register enough volunteers, its Casino application may be cancelled.

#### Objectives of the Alberta Chess Association

For those of you who do not know what the Alberta Chess Association is about, I have listed the Objectives of the ACA, as taken from our Constitution:

- (a) To foster, promote, administer and coordinate chess activities in Alberta.
- (b) To give guidance to any group wishing to form a chess club in the province and to help maintain existing clubs.
- (c) To give direct assistance to junior chess, recognizing a need for special assistance.
- (d) To host specific Sponsored Events to give continuity to chess in Alberta.
- (e) To represent the Alberta chess community to the Chess Federation of Canada, local government and other associations.
  The ACA has traditionally listed another

The ACA has traditionally listed another objective, which is not in our orginal constitution:

(f) To provide leadership and organizational training to those individuals and groups involved in chess in Alberta. In a nutshell, the mission of the ACA might be considered to be:

To promote and foster the growth of competitive and recreational chess by administering and supporting chess activities in Alberta for all people residing in Alberta.

and our purpose is:

To promote and foster the game of chess in Alberta and to ensure that chess is available for recreation, education, enjoyment, and competition.

I am considering proposing the above as part of our Constitution, which would necessitate agreement by a "Special Resolution" passed by 75% of members at the next Annual General Meeting.

#### → Changes to Travel Support to National Championships →

The ACA has been paying full travel costs of its reps to national tournaments (i.e. Closed, Women's Closed, Junior, and Cadet). Henceforth, due to decreased funding, representatives to the Canadian Closed, Canadian Women's Closed and Canadian Junior will be reimbursed for 75% of their travel costs to a maximum of \$500. In addition, to receive travel assistance to the National Tournament the rep must have at least 2 participation points from playing in Alberta tournaments and these points must be accumulated prior to the Alberta Championship tournament. For the Alta Closed Champion, this isn't a problem as 2 participation points are already an Alta Closed entry requirement. For the Alta Women's Closed, Alta Junior and Alta Cadet, some participants

who qualify by rating may be invited to play who aren't active in Alberta chess. Should such a player win the tournament and become Alberta Champion, that player has the right to represent Alberta at the national tournament but would have to self-finance the travel. Participation points have been added to encourage our reps to participate in Alberta tournaments.

Alta Closed qualifiers are worth 1 point (see column 3). For juniors only and only to determine eligibility for travel assistance if the junior wins the Alta Junior or Women's Closed, there are additional "1 point events": N. & S. Alta Cadets, Alta Cadet & Junior, and N. & S. Alta Juniors. All other tournaments are worth 1/2 point (a maximum of 1 point can be earned for directing).

## Qualifying for the 1993 Alberta Closed — full rules available from the ACA —

Participants must have at least 2 participation points since the previous Alta Closed. Qualifying events (except the previous Alta Closed) are worth 1 pt; all other rated Alberta events 1/2 pt. (TD's get up to 1 participation point through directing.)

All wishing to participate (qualifiers or by rating) must register in writing. The ACA must receive the written registration by March 10. It is the potential entrant's responsibility to register—the ACA need not issue invitations.

Eight participants. Round robin Easter weekend. Site: Calgary. EF \$20 (all to prize fund; qualifying tournaments contribute \$1 per entry toward prizes; minimum of \$250: 1st-50%, 2nd-30%, 3rd-20%).

Each candidate must have been an Alberta resident at least 6 months in the year before the Closed. Candidates qualify by their earliest eligible qualification opportunity. Check rules for tiebreaking. If player(s) still needed (no automatic entrants by rating!), the highest rated registrant(s) in the latest CFC rating list prior to March 10, will be accepted (but must have completed at least 1 qualifying event). Note: organizers must apply to hold "Rural Qualifiers".

Qualifying events for the '93 Alta Closed' '92 Alta Closed; Alta Open; Alta Jr Closed; S. Alta Open; Edmonton Closed; Calgary Closed; N. Alta Open; "Rural Candidate".

#### You can get into the 1993 Alberta Closed by Rating, but...

There will be at least one player who will qualify based on rating as no rural qualifer is planned. Remember, though, that anyone qualifying for the Alberta Closed by rating (or by a Qualifier!) <u>MUST</u> send a written submission to the ACA, to be received on or before March 10/93, stating a desire to play in the Alberta Closed. If you do not write, you will not be considered.

#### Even More Alberta Closed Info

- Travel subsidies for out of town entrants in the Alberta Closed are no longer provided due to reduced funding available to the ACA.
- The format for the Alberta Closed will be a three-day tournament with three rounds on the first day, two rounds on the second day and two rounds on the final day.
- The 1994 Alberta Closed is in Edmonton.

#### Please Don't Let the Alberta Closed Players Feel Lonely

The ACA has scheduled 2 open tournaments and the <u>Alberta Women's Closed</u> to run at the Alberta Closed site and on the same weekend. This will give you a chance to play alongside Alberta's best. You can enter the <u>Alberta Active</u>, a one-day active event on Friday, April 9, and/or the <u>Alberta Reserves</u>, a two-day, four-round Swiss April 10-11.

#### Dale Delivers at Alberta 1800 & Over

Dale Haessel overcame another batch of opponents, scoring 4.5/5 and outdistancing Arthur Odachowski, who was second at 3/5. Due to the small turnout (too common a stat for Calgary weekenders recently), the 6 entrants played a round robin. Lev Becker was 3rd at 2.5/5, followed at 2/5 by Jim Daniluk and Paul Usselman. Bill Bentley trailed with a single win-not too surprising since he was the lowest-rated entrant. Jim Van Wyck and Dale Haessel were co-TD's.

#### Two Top Alberta Under 1800

Kevin Yano and Andrew Beingessner were co-winners of 1992's Under 1800. They scored 4-1 in the 12-player Swiss. Brian Murdoch, flying Red Deer's flag, was clear 3rd at 3.5-1.5. Others scoring 50% or better were Arthur Milne and Michael Eng, 3-2, and Dave Gomboc and Bill Rusk, 2.5-2.5.

#### Familiar Winner at Calgary Fall Open

Dale Haessel (Where have we heard that name before?) surprised no one when he finished with 6.5 points in this 7-round Calgary CC Swiss. #### Hassling at the Southern Alberta Open

Dale Haessel hustled all opponents to win another Alberta Closed Qualifier by notching a perfect 4-0 in this 12-player Swiss. Réjean Plante lost only to Haessel to take second. His 3-1 score was matched by Franck Pellerin, who was 1st Under 1800, followed by Ben Vandermeer. Vern Taerum and David Ottosen tied for the Under 1600 prize. Barney Fegyverneki directed (thanks to Barney for the prize lists and crosstables used by the Editor to write the reports in this column).

#### 3-Way Tie at Golden Harvest Open by Jim Kanester (Organizer)

A small turnout of 9 came to this first tournament of the 1992-93 Alberta-B.C. Peace River Grand Prix. It was held September 26 and 27, 1992 at the Dawson Creek Art Gallery. Grant MacTavish, winner of the Grand Prix for the past two years, tied with Forrest Nelson and Derek McCracken (Prince George) at 3 points. Disappointingly, no Grande Prairie players turned up; however, they insist that they will be at later tournaments. No problem, because we would have beaten them anyway!

John Clemens of Dawson Creek won the Under 1700 section with 2.5 points. Steven Reynolds was the Top Junior and won a full membership for his efforts against the big, bad adults.

This 2nd Peace River Grand Prix tournament was held Saturday, Oct. 24/92. Ten players from Dawson Creek, Grande Prairie, and Ft. St. John participated in the 4-round active event. Larry Stutzman was organizer, tournament director, and the undefeated winner (4-0). Grant MacTavish of Dawson Creek was second with 3 wins, while two players-Gordon MacDonald of Dawson Creek and Phil Lefkowitz of Grande Prairie-shared the Under 1700 cash at 3 wins.

Grant MacTavish had the Grand Prix lead after this event with 6 points.

#### Grant Great at D.C. Fall Active by Jim Kanester

A small group of only 7 players turned out for this 4-round active tournament held on November 28 in Dawson Creek. Grant MacTavish of Dawson Creek was undefeated at 4 points, again proving himself the best in the west (northeast?). He won a \$60 CFC gift certificate for his efforts. His main opposition, Larry Stutzman of Ft. St. John, was second with 3 points. Gordon MacDonald was first in the Under 1700 class with 2 points and won himself a chess clock.

Eric Schocat came 2nd on tiebreak over Ferenc Borloi and Geoff Newton (all 4/6). George Kohler's 3/6 gave him first "Under 1700", followed by Randy Gouge (2.5).

Honorable mention goes to Sherwin Chan, who suffered an early setback and a quick draw in round three which cost him his chance to represent Alberta again. In one game, Douglas Wu checkmated his opponent, Rob Curtis, one second after his flag fell. Unfortunately, Rob noticed this two seconds too late. In another game, Aaron Lovi lost on time with a queen advantage against Douglas (Aaron had previously dropped a piece, but Douglas returned the favor with interest).

When the dust had settled, Valentine Pui claimed first prize in the 15-player Active whirlwind, defeating Dave Ottosen in the last round in a tactical blizzard. In the Under 1300 section, Cynthia Wu and Paul Kirvan, each with 2.5, had to play six hurricane playoff games before Cynthia claimed the book prize. In the Under 1000 section, Bernie Kan and Matilda Machnowski tied at 2/4 each, with Bernie winning the playoff.

The Canadian Chess Challenge National Finals features matches between Provincial (and Territorial) teams-composed of one representative per team in each school grade (1-12)—to determine the top players in Canada in each grade and the top teams.

Alberta will be the host this year for the Chess Challenge Nationals (May 23-24, Banquet Room, Lister Hall, University of Alberta, Edmonton).

Many schools in Alberta have already held tournaments to qualify students to the various regional playdowns (February 27 in Calgary, Edmonton, the northeast region, and Grande Prairie; the ACR Editor is not sure of the dates of other regionals).
