1995 Southern Alberta Open by Grant Brown, TD


No problems; everything went smoothly. There were only 18 players (8 in the Open section—3 from Edmonton; 10 in the <1800), partly because of the weather, I think.

Greg Huber won the Open section with 4.5/5—although he dropped a draw in round 1 against Art Milne and almost drew in round 2 (up a pawn in a Bs of opposite colour ending) against Leo Danglapen. Things picked up from there—he beat Paul Usselman, Farzan Nazarian, and David Ottosen (for his victory over Dave, Greg won the Best Game prize). John Quiring, Usselman and Danglapen split the 2nd-3rd place prize money (and it looks like Ottosen got a 50% share of the \$25 as the loser in the 'best game' prize contest; thanks to Grant for donating the 'best game' and 'best rating gain' prizes! - ed).

Jordan Davies and Jose Managase tied for 1st in the Under 1800 section, with 3.5/5. Jordan won the \$25 best rating gain prize. Verne Taerum, Jonathan Day and Nick Podolchak followed at 3 points, just out of the money. Jeff Huang, Rodney Stoesz and Rishi Patel split the Top Under 1550 cash.





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Two Weekends Before Xmas Open by Jeff Cummer, TD (Organizer: Ford Wong)

Twenty-eight players came in from the cold on December 16-17 to play chess in the sauna of the City Centre Inn in Edmonton. This made one less entrant than the previous year, because this time I decided not to play, but the total of twenty-eight was reached entirely without the assistance of Calgarians. Imagine, if there hadn't been a junior tournament the same Saturday, and a few Calgarians had decided to make the journey north, it might have been the largest tournament in the province in years...oh, well...I was happy.

So, it wasn't the biggest tournament, but it was possibly the strongest, boasting more masters than the Alberta Closed. Last year's winner, Sasha Grumic, along with Nigel Fullbrook, Yuri Vasylev and Arniel Frialde, formed a log jam at the top in round 4. Grumic and Fullbrook defeated Vasylev and Frialde, respectively, and just as I was eagerly anticipating another classic Fullbrook-Grumic battle, they agreed to a draw, before the game actually (if I recall correctly from what Jeff told me, they did play something like 5 'moves' - ed), and they took home \$87.50 apiece.

[CFC Tournament Rule Art. 10.10(2): "It is unethical and unsportsmanlike to agree to a draw before a serious contest has begun. The same is true of all agreements to prearrange game results. In cases of clear violations of the moral principles of the game, a director should impose penalties at his discretion." Fortunately for Grumic and Fullbrook, I did not look this up until I got home that night, or the game would have been a double forfeit, and the players fined and expelled from the tournament.]

John Quiring, however, took the moral high ground throughout, in winning the top Expert prize of \$60. He refused draws in several rounds, grinding out his opponents in the ending long after all other games in the round were over. In the fifth round he needed a draw to clinch the prize, as did his opponent, Dan Federkevic. Quiring refused a draw offer, later blundered a piece to a two-move combination, then accepted his opponent's draw offer. Federkevic said that he offered the draw because of his nerves (indeed, he is probably the most nervous chess player I have ever seen). He took home \$50 for his efforts in winning the 1800-1999 prize.

Daryl Bertrand won the top 1700-1799 prize (\$50), as he continued his hot streak, losing only to Vasylev and Frialde, while 'scalping' David Ottosen. His round two win

over Ottosen was his easiest of the tournament, as Ottosen stayed up ALL night talking to GMs on the Internet, then snuck behind the room partition to catch a quick nap after his first round victory, waking about half an hour after he had forfeited the game.

Duncan Campbell took the 1500-1699 prize with a last round victory over newcomer Dan Hermansen. Campbell managed to exactly duplicate Bertrand's victory over Ottosen to gain the point, and \$40.

Another newcomer, Kay Duchesne of Llyodminster, formerly of the People's Republic of China, won the Under 1500/Unrated prize of \$30. She quickly gained respect as she nearly upset Harold Climenhaga in the first round, and played strong chess throughout the tournament.

Climenhaga won the upset prize, with his victory over Kenneth Chao in the third round, but was not available to collect his \$25 (Jeff, I trust you put it away in an interest-bearing account for him...just kidding - ed)



ALBERTA JUNIOR CHESS REPORT

Alberta Junior by David Ottosen

The 1995 Alberta Junior saw longtime junior kingpin Adam Wu in his final year of eligibility, and with a host of players eager to get their last crack at him before he moves on to 'fogey' chess with the rest of us. However, it was not to be a triumphant departure for Adam, as little brother Douglas Wu shed his nickname 'Mud' to take the Alberta Junior championship in shocking fashion. Although Adam defeated Douglas in their individual encounter, Adam's GM-likedraws with black cost him the title. Fortunately, he picked off one of the rating spots for the Canadian Junior, and both Wu brothers will go to Windsor.

Jim Roy acquired a dead lost exchange down ending before voodooing Nathan McLean into falling into a mate. Alec Mill's slow system against Doug Wu's Sicilian failed to hold back the attack. Adam Wu's troubles began with the following game against his sister Beatrice:

Behind them, the brothers Kan (Bernie and Arthur), Jeremiah Gallinger, Alim Merali, Rishi Patel and newcomer Faizal Virani all scored 3. In the playoff, Rishi claimed the book prize.

The contrast in atmospheres between here and the junior was shocking to me as a tournament director. A more serious atmosphere would likely improve the quality of play.]

There were 22 players. Gurb Singh outclassed the field in the top division. Gerard O'Reilly, who has a national reputation on the scholastic chess scene, cleaned up in his division—he's in grade 5 at St. Cecilia School. John Webster took honours in the third division. Shandy Booth, in grade 1 at University Elementary, shut out his older opponents—his scholastic rating went from 301 to 399.

Only 13 players (perhaps it was too close to Xmas; we'll see what happens at the next tournament, January 21st). Joseph Sealy-Harrington, in the 2nd grade at University Elementary (what do they feed kids at that school anyway?), won the rated under 400 division, which resulted in his rating leaping from 301 to 513! Adam Alladin took top honors in his division—he's in grade 7 at Queen Elizabeth School and now has an 811 scholastic rating.

Canadian Youth Chess Festival: The Road To Montreal 1996 by Ford Wong

Several changes have occurred since the successful first year of this event. It is now the 'Canadian Youth Chess Festival' instead of 'Corel Canadian Youth Chess Festival' (Corel, last year's major sponsor, withdrew its support). This year the event has been taken over by Chess'n Math, which also sponsors the Canadian Chess Challenge. Congratulations to Nigel Sharp (Under 10), Gerard O'Reilly (Under 12), Douglas Wu (Under 14) and Gurb Singh (Under 18), who will represent Alberta at the 1996 Canadian Youth Chess Festival Finals in Montreal in January.

Alberta Finals (Edmonton, December)

Under 10—Nigel Sharp salvaged a draw against favorite Stephen Hazeltine and won all his other games to finish first. Stephen fell short when he surrendered a first round draw to Kevin Mayo. Nigel was the story of the day as he is only 5 years old. (Note: Nigel, like Capablanca, started playing chess at the age of 4, but proud father Neil was not about to unleash Nigel on the chess world until he was ready, i.e. Nigel needed to work on his concentration and attention span.)

Under 12—Gerard O'Reilly placed clear first with a perfect 4-0 record. Second and third place required a playoff between Alim Merali, Wendy LaValley and Justin Pagliaroli, who finished in that order, respectively.

Under 14 — Douglas Wu, the current Alberta Junior champion, withstood all challenges to win. A surprising but strong performance was given by Jesse Darling.

Under 18—Gurb Singh was in trouble in several games but managed to finish tied for first. His games included a round 1 win against Zach Sonnleitner, who couldn't finish him off with 2 extra pieces at one point. Gurb won a playoff with Dmitri Shefer to take the under 18 group. Jeremiah Gallinger could've finished clear first, but failed to win in the last round vs. Dmitri.

This year it is <u>not</u> necessary to begin competition at the school level. Anyone may enter a regional tournament. Entry fee is \$10, payable at the tournament site. Make cheques payable to 'Canadian Chess Challenge'.

Choose the regional tournament which is most convenient (it's safe to assume you can only play in one regional - ed). Call your regional tournament organizer for more details—this will help to give the organizer an idea of approximately how many students will attend his regional tournament.

Qualifying for 1996 Alberta Closed (full rules available from the ACA)

All entrants need at least 2 participation points since the previous Alta Closed. Qualifying events (except prev. Alta Closed) are worth 1 pt; all other CFC-rated Alberta events 1/2 pt. (TDs get up to 1 pt by directing.)

ALL wishing to participate (current Champion; qualifiers; byrating) must register in writing (verifying eligibility requirements met). The ACA must receive the written registration by 10 March 1996. It is the responsibility of the potential entrant to register—the ACA need not issue invites.

Eight player RR Easter Weekend. EF\$20, all to prize fund. Qualifying tournaments, except Calgary and Edmonton Closeds, contribute \$1 per entry towards prizes. Prize fund minimum \$250: 1st-50%; 2nd-30%; 3rd-20%.

Candidates qualify by earliest eligible qualification chance. Each must have been an Alberta resident for at least 6 months prior to the Closed.

If player(s) still needed (no automatic entrants by rating!), the registrant(s) highest rated in the latest CFC list before March 10 will be accepted (entrants by rating must have completed at least 1 qualifier).

Qualifying events for '96 Alberta Closed: '95—Alta Closed; Alta Open; Alta Jr Closed; S. Alta Open. '96—Edmonton (ECC) and Calgary (CCC) Closeds; N. Alta Open. 'Rural Candidate'—organizers must apply to hold Rural Qualifiers (held by January 31st; rural candidate must reside in a region other than Calgary or Edmonton). If no rural qualifier, the ACA may sponsor a Rural Open Qualifier (open to all but those already qualified).

Should a qualifying tournament winner be unable or unwilling to attend the Alberta Closed, or not otherwise qualify, that position will be filled from the list of players who have requested in writing by March 10th to qualify by rating (exception: Edmonton and Calgary Closeds—the 2nd place finisher can qualify).

Leo Danglapen snagged first place with a 6-1 score, losing only to Art Milne in round 5. Walter Watson, ACA President, was clear second at 5.5-1.5, losing to Danglapen in round four and drawing Bill Bentley in round 5. Milne (lost to Watson in round 6) and Bentley (lost to Danglapen in round 3), who were paired together in the last round, drew that game to finish tied for third at 4.5-2.5.
