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1994 ALBERTA OPEN

The 1994 Alberta Open was played in the East Room of the Regency Hotel and featured a raised stage for boards one to three. A total of 37 players (one a no-show) entered, including an invasion of eleven Calgarians (a third of all the participants) and one Lethbridgian. It has been a while since there have been so many Calgary players in an Edmonton tournament—it was great to see them out.

The tournament went smoothly and was practically problem-free. In round one all the players were recipients of a free 'lecture' courtesy of the next room as their PA system drowned out the entire room. Several players tried to get around this problem by donning their walkmans-how successful they were, I don't know. After the 'lecture', it was quiet sailing, with the exception of TD problems such as time scrambles (there seemed to be more than usual). The first time control of 40/ 2 induced many people into time scrambles and kept the TD's busy. In each round, near the three hour mark, we could expect several scrambles to be on the way. Jim Daniluk was proud of his time scrambles as he managed his shortages to his advantage to win (in September in the Over 1800 in Calgary, he flagged several times and lost).

The eventual co-winners of the Alberta Open were Hafiz Karmali and Dale Haessel. They met in round 4, but settled nothing in a hard-fought draw (Karmali had additional help in the form of the raised stage, which tried to swallow Haessel not once, but twice). In the last two rounds they defeated all would-becontenders to remain tied for first (Karmali's better second tiebreak qualified him for the 1995 Alberta Closed). Chris Dartana quietly snuck up from behind to take third place (besides taking 3rd overall, Chris was thrilled to have 'finally' made it to board three and thus have the honor of playing on the stage).

Walter saw in the August ACR that results of Calgary tournaments were slow to come in, so he kindly sent in what he could about some Calgary Chess Club tournaments, i.e. the Spring Open (including a complete crosstable and all prize winners), a June 21st speed tournament, and the 4 active events run over the summer—we got a separate report for the Aug. 2 & 9 Active (see Chris Demers' report below), so we'll use Walter's for the other three. Thanks, Walter!

Spring Open-May 3 to June 14

Chris Demers won easily (7-0) and wasn't in trouble in any of his games. Jim Daniluk also played strongly (5.5) to take second. Walter Watson (4.5) was 1st 'Class B' (Walter said that he was initially listed at a rating of 1495—his CFC number—which caused some confusion in the early rounds). Equal 2nd in Class B were Dave Gomboc and Lee Nagle (the TD). Top 'Class C/Unrated' went to Ted Lockert, with a 3-way tie for 2nd by Nick Podolchak, Jack King and Chris Clark.

Dale Haessel (5-0) won first prize, followed at 3.5-1.5 by Jim Daniluk (2nd prize) and Walter Watson (top unrated prize). Watson won top unrated without playing either of the other two top finishers. [TD: Dave Gomboc.]

July Openby Jeff Cummer, TD

The 1994 July Open was held at the Quality Inn in Calgary's motel village on July 23-24. Only twelve players entered, with two-thirds rated over 1800 and an 1841 average.

Calgarian **Dale Haessel** defeated Nandor Tot of Medicine Hat in the last round to win first place in the open section, undefeated at 4/5. Tot and Calgary's Arthur Odachowski shared second place with 3.5/5, after Odi beat Jim Daniluk (3/5) of Calgary in the last round.

The under 2000 section was won by Lethbridge player Grant Brown with 3/5. Half a point behind were Calgary's Art Milne and Edmonton's Dave Ottosen—they 'upset' Odachowski and Haessel, respectively, in the first round by securing draws. Their reward for their efforts? Being paired with Haessel and Odachowski, respectively, in the next round.

The under 1800/unrated section was won by Calgary's Leo Danglapen, an unrated player who scored 3/5 with a performance rating of 1845, including a victory over John Quiring (1964).

The biggest surprise was 11-year-old John Rajchel, underrated at 942. As the lowest seed, he gave up 350 rating points to his nearest competitor, but drew with Lenny Leung (1632) in round 2 and defeated Peter Alderton (1293) in round 3. Due to the intricacies of the Swiss pairing system, he faced top seed Arthur Odachowski in the 4th round, a difference of 1299 rating points. Needless to say, he was happy with his 1.5/5 result, and his performance rating was nearly 700 points above his rating going in!

The 1994 Alberta Junior was probably one of the best Championships in recent years in terms of quality and well-played games. It was hard fought all the way to the end, with no one backing down from anyone. Wins were earned the hard way as witnessed by Beatrice Wu-Nathan McLean, which took almost six hours to complete.

In the end, favorite Adam Wu survived with a 4.0 score to remain the Alberta Junior Champion and to qualify for the Canadian Junior. Second place was a four-way tie between Beatrice Wu, Douglas Wu, Jason Ventura and Nathan McLean.

Douglas Wu, a last minute sub for John Rajchel, finished with 2.5 points and could have easily had 4.5 points to become Junior Champion. He was winning in his last two games (against Wong and McLean) but couldn't deliver the knock out punches and had to settle for draws. Douglas could have won in round one against Jason Ventura but lost in heavy time pressure. To complete his weekend, Douglas had his first ever win against older brother Adam.

Jason Ventura, with help from Douglas Wu beating Adam Wu, lead after day one but powered out on day two with two straight losses against A. and B. Wu, respectively. He had hoped to draw Adam and then beat Beatrice to win. However, Adam opened with something unfamiliar and from then on it was downhill. Beatrice Wu beat Matthew Wong and Jason Ventura to avenge losses to them in the Northern Alberta Junior. Matthew Wong's sneaky endgame technique helped him to salvage two draws. The last round game between Douglas Wu and Nathan McLean was a preview of what to expect at the Alberta Cadet in December. Nathan McLean's fortress building style of play against the Wu's netted him 1.5 points on the last day to help him finish tied for second.

As TD, I found most of the games were very well played and interesting, with no major blunders to determine the outcome. In fact, my infatuation with the last round game between Matthew Wong and Adam Wu lead me to an embarrassing moment. The game had me so engrossed that without thinking I inadvertently sat down in Matthew Wong's chair while he was away, and sat there enjoying the game until someone snapped me out of it. Perhaps this has something to do with my having just turned 40.

The EJCC September Sanity by Adam Wu

The EJCC opened the 1994/95 season by welcoming 18 players to 2 sections: a 4-player double round robin for the 9 and under crowd, and a 5-round Swiss for the remaining 14 over-the-hill geriatrics. The division was made arbitrarily by organizer Ford Wong and co-TD Adam Wu, and had some warts. For example, newcomer Julian Fischer (along with sister Lisa—what names for chess players!), at age10, probably would have been more successful in the younger group, while Canadian Chess Challenge Alberta grade 2 champ Angie Seitz, though only eight, could likely compete with the rest of the 'old fogies.'

Despite the tournament's name, co-TD's Adam and Beatrice Wuhad extreme difficulty keeping theirs intact, as nearly every player suddenly decided to use all the allotted time every round, leaving 2 or 3 minutes for the hapless TD's to make the pairings. In the last round, the group of 6 players with 2 points had played each other so often, that of all the possible combinations and permutations of pairings between them, only one was marginally legal. Add to this time scrambles that struck unexpectedly, furiously, often, and invariably decisively, or the incident where a player called his opponent for touch move, who denied the call, and none of the 18 players, 2 TD's, 1 organizer, and 3 parents in the vicinity witnessed the incident, and it was a miracle we actually got some chess done.

[Note: I checked out the procedures for incidents such as the one mentioned above. The TD has the right to make an arbitrary decision in such cases, (which of course, can be appealed) ranging from issuing a warning, deciding in favour of one player or another, replaying the game, forfeiting both players, or even ejecting one or both players from the tournament. In my limited chess experience, I have never heard of the last two being used.]

Remember the Greek guy who skipped around the world on the phrase 'I come, I see, I conquer?' Well, much the same thing happened with **Angie Seitz**, who travelled 5 hours to Edmonton and cleaned house in the nine and under section, finishing with 5/6 and claiming a magnetic travelling chess set for her efforts. She so terrorized the opposition that we're still debating whether to allow her back into that section! Scott Mayo finished second with 4/6, and won the distinction of being the only player to dent Angie's record.

Now, back to the remaining 'over-the-hillers'. The 5-round Swiss quickly shaped up into a 3-way race between Matthew Wong, Cynthia Wu, and Jeremiah Gallenger. As they met and murdered each other in the middle rounds in games that utterly defied logic, Bernie Kan calmly racked up the points and joined them, so that when round five rolled around, four players were vying for first, and playing each other.

In round three, Matthew Wong met Cynthia Wu. With the black pieces, Cynthia achieved a comfortable position, and then the old ticker struck, and the tables turned abruptly. In the ensuing scramble, Matthew earned the notable distinction of being the first player since Aaron Lovi to use more time than Cynthia. Matthew outplayed his opponent in the time scramble, but, unfortunately, his flag fell just before he had MATE IN ONE!

Round 4 saw Jeremiah and Cynthia playing for the lead. After weathering a blistering attack, Cynthia achieved a winning material edge. But then the clock struck again, and when the dust cleared, Jeremiah found himself with four pawns for a piece. Unfortunately, they were configured into two pairs of doubled, isolated pawns, and the game ended drawn.

Fireworks also flew in the last round, as Jeremiah and Matthew played ping pong with their queens. Matthew got the last lucky bounce, however, and ended up with an extra queen. **Cynthia Wu**, for the upteenth time, weathered a sacrificial attack and a time scramble against Bernie Kan to claim clear first with 4.5/5. Paul Kirvan defeated Alim Merali to take the under-1200 prize with 3/5.

The EJCC extends a warm welcome to the five newcomers (you know who you are!) and hopes that they will return in the future.

Finally, the players were entertained with an excruciatingly difficult problem, courtesy of Ford, that nobody could solve until Ford revealed the first move. As well, Aaron Lovi and Douglas Wu played a four game active match concurrently with the tournament, which Aaron won 3-1.

EJCC October Oddity "Active" by Ford Wong

The Wu's were playing in the Alberta Open, so a low turnout might have been expected. However, 15 players ventured forth to do battle. Matthew Wong, who recently qualified for the Alberta Junior, emerged victorious with a perfect 5-0 score. In the Under 1100 section, Alim Merali appeared to have a book prize in hand, but saw it go to lowest-rated Mike McColl, who won in the last round against Ben Berci. Mark Kirvan, EJCC co-organizer, relented under intense pressure and let 7-year-old daughter Helen don armour and enter into her first 64-square In addition to Helen, another new combatant welcomed was Steven Rutledge, who came looking for some worthy opponents...and found them.

Oh, well...

Alberta 1800-and-Over / Under 1800 by Ford Wong

The fifteen player 1800-and-Over was won by **Dale Haessel**, with a 4.5/5 score. Greg Huber and John Ferrar tied for second place. John, an expert from the British Isles and a newcomer to Alberta, had a performance rating of 2300. Qualifying for the 1995 Alberta Closed

— full rules available from the ACA—

Participants must have at least <u>2 participation points</u> since the previous Alta Closed. Qualifying events (except the previous Alta Closed) are worth 1 pt, all other rated Alberta events 1/2 pt. (TD's get up to 1 participation point through directing.)

ALL wishing to participate (qualifiers or by rating) must register in writing. The ACA must receive the written registration by March 10. It is the potential entrant's responsibility to register—the ACA need not issue invitations.

Eight player round robin. EF \$20—all to prize fund; qualifying tournaments contrib-

ute \$1 per entry toward prizes; minimum of \$250: 1st-50%, 2nd-30%, 3rd-20%.

Each candidate must have been an Alberta resident at least 6 months in the year before the Closed. Candidates qualify by earliest eligible qualification chance. Check rules for tiebreaking. If player(s) still needed (no automatic entrants by rating!), the registrant(s) highest rated in the latest CFC rating list before March 10, will be accepted (entrants by rating must also have completed at least 1 qualifier—the Northern Alberta Open, Feb 25-26, is the final qualifier scheduled).

Organizers must apply to hold Rural Qualifiers. If there is no bona fide rural quali-

fier, the ACA may, at its discretion, sponsor a Rural Open Qualifier (open to all but those already otherwise qualified).

Qualifying events for the '95 Alta Closed '94: Alta Closed; Alta Open; Alta Jr Closed; S. Alta Open; '95: Edmonton Closed; Calgary Closed; N. Alta Open; "Rural Candidate".

For all qualifying tournaments (except Edmonton Closed and Calgary Closed), should the winner be unable or unwilling to attend the Alberta Closed, or should such winner not otherwise qualify, that position will be filled from the rating list. (Note: for the Edmonton Closed and Calgary Closed, the possible attendance of the 2nd place finisher is covered by 'Rule 18'.)
