Sasata, Kazmaier share top spot at Alberta Open

Veteran Robert Sasata of Saskatoon and junior Daniel Kazmaier of Calgary shared the top honors at the 2007 Alberta Open Chess Championship

Going into the final round, International Master Torstein Bae of Norway had a half point lead in the sixround Thanksgiving weekend competition at West Edmonton Fantasyland Hotel, but ran into time trouble against Sasata and flagged in a complex position.

Even with a time control

of game/120 minutes plus 30 second increments, there were several other games which saw players lose on time.

Sasata's win over Bae opened the door for the winner of Kazmaier- Blagoj Gicev game to join him to share first place. Kazmaier seized the opportunity and won a convincing game. Gicev was victim to another of Alberta's young lions as

he also lost to Eric Hansen in rounds 3.

Also In round Kazmaier was a handful for Torstein Bae, but Bae escaped with a draw.

Bae ended up sharing third place with Rob Gardner and Victor Kaminski.

Sasata, Kazmaier and Kaminski were the only players to go undefeated throughout the tournament. With his shared victory at the Alberta Open, Dan Kazmaier qualified for the Alberta Closed and has a chance to become Alberta Champion.

Yearwood wins the loot at Medicine Hat Open

For a change, the 13th annual Medicine Hat Open Chess Tournament took place on a glorious, sunny, warm mid-September weekend - the previous two years had been cold and rainy.

This year, we welcomed 16 participants. Roy Yearwood, the 2003 Medicine Hat winner, was the sole representative from Calgary while the father and son pairing of Don and Keith MacKinnon arrived from North Battleford, Saskatchewan. The younger MacKinnon was the 2006 winner and the first junior to ever win the event.

From Lethbridge came Kurt Berndtsson, Jack Davies, and Dr. Paul Viminitz who appeared to be recovering fairly well from his serious car accident in April. The usual Edmonton foursome of John Quiring, Ford Wong, Steve Panteluk and Stan Longson made the trip.

Making even a longer driving trip of ten hours for his first time at this event was Tim Pradzinski of Grande Prairie.

While 14-year-old Keith MacKinnon was hoping to be the first person to ever win the Medicine Hat Open two years in a row, that was not to happen as Yearwood finished first with a 4.5/5 score. MacKinnon and Yearwood drew in the third round. In the fourth round, I managed to give Yearwood a scare with a slightly better mid-game position, but it turned into a lost end game. Then in the fifth round, young MacKinnon was out to beat me so he could tie for first place, but in an Alekhine's defense, I was able to equalize the mid game and take advantage of a questionable exchange in the late middle game. MacKinnon, however, skillfully achieved a draw and ended up with 4.0 points for second place.

Tied for third with 3.5 each was myself and Adam Szulski who ended up also being the top performer in the lower section of the entrants list.

For his tournament victory, Yearwood acquired a

beautiful artistic chess set donated by Framing and Art Centre and a nice black striped dress shirt. MacKinnon received a picture of the Bobby Orr "Flying Leap" celebration after scoring a Stanley Cup winning goal and a large pullover, which his dad assured him he will grow into.

In the lower section of eight players, prize recipients were: first - Szulski, second - Davies who scored 3.0, and third - Panteluk who had a 2.5 score.

Throughout the weekend, players enjoyed a variety of muffins, coffee, fruit and candies, provided by the Medicine Hat Chess Club and 51 local sponsors. The Saturday night "Dessert and Drinks" social was held for the fifth consecutive year, and the popular "Lunch for a Buck" was held Sunday.

The top Under 1900 prize was also share with \$60 each going to John McIntyre, Roger Blum, Lyndon Soerensen, Terry Chaisson, and Jason Danner.

ACA collecting low-cost associate memberships

Needing to count more people as part of organized chess, Alberta Chess Association is now collecting Associate Membership fees of \$3 for juniors and senior citizens and \$5 for adults.

Associate members will receive the Alberta Chess Report and be considered supporters of chess, but they will not be considered voting members nor can they play in a Chess Federation of Canada (CFC) tournament without purchasing a full CFC/ACA membership or paying the CFC participating fee.

Players who participate in CFC-rated events are already full ACA members.

The largest number of associate memberships will be obtained by junior

players who are only rated by the Chess'n Math Association which does not charge a membership fee

While there are only about 300 full ACA members, there are hundreds of students playing chess around the province who are not counted as members in any chess organization.

Sponsorship and government grants are often based on membership numbers, and proof of membership is usually established by a person paying an actual membership fee and providing their address.

Bruce Thomas has long advocated that an associate membership be charged by the ACA so that hundreds of student players could be officially

counted as members of a chess organization.

This idea was finally adopted by the ACA board of directors in August.

At the ACA annual meeting in October, Thomas turned over \$600 to the ACA for the first 200 associate memberships collected through The Roving ChessNuts scholastic programs in Edmonton and region.

It is estimated that up to 700 students annually will become associate members and organizers of chess clubs are being asked to also sell the memberships to their players who do not join the CFC.

Money generated by the new memberships are expected to be channelled into junior programs and other ACA projects.

Gardner victorious in September event at Edmonton CC

At Edmonton Chess Club on Thursdays during September, Rob Gardner captured first place in the Back to School Open.

Gardner, the highest rated in the accelerated swiss event, scored 3.5 in his four

games.

Finishing in a tie for second place among the event's 22 players were Rick Pedersen, Allan Wu, Gerhard Reuter and Arnold McKay, each scored 2.5.

Mike Sekuloff is new ACA president

At the annual general meeting of the Alberta Chess Association on October 7 during the Alberta Open Chess Championship, Mike Sekuloff of Edmonton was elected ACA President for a two-year term. Sekuloff defeated Bruce Thomas, also of Edmonton, in the balloting by about two dozen ACA members.

Sekuloff takes over the ACA reigns from Ford Wong of Edmonton who will remain on the board of directors as past

president.

The only other executive office to be filled was treasurer which Tim Pradzinski of Grande Prairie was awarded by acclamation.

Micah Hughey of Edmonton and Paul Viminitz of Lethbridge are now into their second year of the respective offices of vice president and secretary.

Elected to a vacant one year term as board director was Dale Haessel of Calgary, and elected to two-year terms as directors were Vladislav Rekhson of Edmonton, Richard Pua of Edmonton, Jim Daniluk of Calgary and Anastasia Kazakevich of Edmonton.

Completing their second year as directors are Mark Cole of Calgary and Robert Davies of St. Albert.

The first meeting of the new ACA board will be held in Red Deer in November.

Young players dominate Over/Under 1800 Championships

With junior players taking four of the top five spots in the Over 1800 section and four of the top six spots in the Under 1800 section, older chess players may feel like they should head for early retirement.

Calgary Chess Club hosted this annual Alberta Chess Association tournament in its new club facilities on September 1 and 2.

Entered in the event were 24 Albertans and the MacKinnons of Saskatchewan who have become frequent competitors in the Wild Rose province as junior Keith MacKinnon rises to higher chess levels while father Don is left far behind.

Calgary's veteran juniors Daniel Kazmaier (4.5 points) and Eric Hansen (4.0 points) took first and second places respectively in the Over 1800 section.

Adult Dale Haessel was third with 3.5.

Junior Chase Cunningham scored four out of a possible five and captured top spot in the Under 1800 section.

Raymond Ong and Peter Thompson tied for second/third places, each getting 3.5 scores.



Edmonton Chess Club continues renovations; Seehagen begins second term as president

Renovations at Edmonton Chess Club are continuing this fall with the installation of new carpet expected soon and then finishing touches will be put on the two-room facility in time for a 100th anniversary celebration for the club in January.

The club has not been without its problems in regards to the second floor space on 124 Street as heating or air conditioning have malfunctioned at various times and leaks in the roof have also caused concerns.

Once some new tables are added, the club tournament room should be able to comfortably handle up to 60 adult players and about 75 junior players.

The club room is proving adequate for most club events, although it is often overflowing with parents and players between games when larger junior tournament are held.

The 100th anniversary

of Edmonton Chess Club will be celebrated January 11, 12 and 13, 2008.

Among the activities planned are a blitz tournament, an official opening of the club's renovated facilities, an open active tournament, a wine and cheese party, simultaneous displays and a lecture, and a junior tournament.

Annual Meeting

On September 20, the club held its annual meeting and Terry Seehagen was elected by acclamation for a second term as president.

Vlad Rekhson was elected vice-president by about two dozen club members.

By acclamation, Bruce Thomas was re-elected secretary while no one challenged Roland Schech when he offered to be club treasurer, a position he had assumed on an interim basis in early 2007

Six people offered to fill three seats as club

directors. After balloting, the three directorships were filled by Micah Hughey, Richard Pua and Mike Zeggelaar.

At the annual meeting, a motion was passed to raise the club's annual membership fee to \$30 effective January 1.

The meeting was also told that the collection of membership fees and nightly dues for non-members had been very lax and that steps were being taken to tighten up procedures.

The club has also applied to the Alberta Gaming Commission for permission to use casino funding for tournament director honorariums and to conduct an educational program which would allow individuals to be paid to teach chess to various skill levels of players.

The club's new board of directors and officers will be holding a meeting Sunday, November 4.

ACA approves FIDE rating for its major tournaments

Vladislav Rekhson proposed a motion at the ACA annual meeting that the main Alberta tournaments be FIDE rated.

An FIDE rating could make participation easier in national and international events. It would also make future players trying to acquire a FIDE rating easier since there would be a larger pool of players to compete against.

To get a FIDE rating, you must play at least three opponents

with established FIDE ratings and must score at least 1 point.

Then you would be placed on a provisional list until you have played a total of 9 FIDE-rated games.

The motion was passed unanimously.

This report, in addition to being the President's Report, will double as the "Planning" Report and an incomplete Financial Report.

The ACA Plan for 2007-2008 is currently under development and is expected to be completed soon. Many of the new projects for 2007-2008 will be covered here.

For the 2007 year, the ACA budgeted \$90,000 and expects a deficit of \$76,200 which will be covered via casino funds.

Overall, 2007 was a somewhat business as usual year as almost all our core projects were done. Here are the highlights (not in any particular order) for the past year (2007):

- 1. The ACA sponsored two grandmaster appearances to Alberta this year.
- The first was Grandmaster Pascal Charbonneau to the Trumpeter Classic in Grande Prairie in January. He also provided a lecture and question and answer session when in Grande Prairie.
- The second was GM Alex Yermolinski who provided a "Training Clinic" to players rated 2200 and over; one weekend in Calgary and another weekend in Edmonton. He also held a simultaneous display and provided a lecture for everyone.
- A third GM (Alexander Shabalov) is expected for the Weekend Before Christmas.
- 2. The ACA provided its usual travel support for all our champions to represent Alberta at the national level. This year the ACA sponsored travel for the following:
- Alberta Chess Challenge Team (12 players plus two coaches) to Canadian Chess Challenge Finals (CCC) Quebec City, Quebec where the team tied British Columbia for third. Congratulations to the 5 Alberta team members who brought home trophies for top three finishes. They were Ryan Loke 3rd in Grade 1, Tony Cai 3rd in Grade 5, Vlad Constantinescu 3rd in Grade 6, Eric Hansen 2nd in Grade 9, and Victor Kaminski 1st in Grade 10. In addition, Eric Hansen was the Open Blitz winner.
- Jered Fokkema, Victor Kaminski, Allan Wu, Thomas Kaminski and Richard Wang to the Canadian Youth Chess Championships (CYCC) held in Ottawa, Ontario. Congratulations to Eric Hansen and Richard Wang at the CYCC who won spots at the World Youth Championships that will be held in Turkey in November.
- Alberta Champion, Jeff Reeve to the Canadian Open in Ottawa.
- Travel for the Alberta Junior Champion to the Canadian Junior remains to be completed. The Alberta Junior Champion will be determined in November at the

Alberta Junior.

For all travel, except to the CCC, the ACA paid for almost 100% of the costs.

3. As in previous years, the ACA has a very aggressive tournament schedule with 33 sponsored tournaments. This gives Albertans plenty of opportunities to play competitive chess. Last year the ACA crowded too many tournaments together at the start of the year. This year the schedule was changed back to previous years. The 2nd International Norms Tournament held in Edmonton was moved to the long weekend in August instead of Easter weekend and this allowed the Alberta Closed, etc to return to that weekend. The January Open was renamed to the Schlienich Memorial in honor of a dedicated chess founder in Calgary who looked after organized chess in Calgary for many

As incentive to promote traveling to Alberta Tournaments, the ACA set up the Road Warrior program to reward the top three players in Alberta who traveled the most during a given year to ACA events.

I would like to commend the organizers such as Micah Hughey, Vlad Rekhson and Jim Daniluk for all their work in keeping things going by ensuring that these tournaments are held. It is a non trivial task to find a location and a tournament director, etc. Kudos also go to the people who volunteered to be Tournament Directors. Due to an injury to the local organizer for the Lethbridge Open, the ACA had to cover the costs of an out of town Tournament Director.

4. Junior chess is growing in Northern Alberta. This growth is mainly attributed to the hard work of Bruce Thomas. Without our junior members the ACA would be hard pressed to have enough members to qualify for ASRPWF funding. There appears to be some headway in getting chess in Southern Alberta back into the fold. One again this year the ACA is supporting "Rural Chess Education program" where the ACA is paying the travel expenses of instructors to go to

- rural Alberta towns and cities to provide chess instruction.
- 5. The ACA provided financial support for the Medicine Hat Chess Club's Giant Chess Set Project for the 2nd year. Bill Taylor says that the Giant Chess Set drew many visitors this year and was great in providing more exposure of chess in Alberta. Until the Medicine Hat Chess Society gets a Casino, Bill Taylor will be seeking help with this project for the next few years. Please see the letter provided by Bill. Hopefully the new ACA board will see fit to support Bill with this project in subsequent years.
- 6. The ACA still provides tournament equipment such as sets and in some cases new clocks to clubs which request them.
- 7. This year, the ACA has published two ACRs and hopes to have another by the end of the year. It would be nice to return back to a regular five/six issues a year. Thanks go to Bruce Thomas with prodding by Richard Pua
- 8. This year, Mike Sekuloff took over the ACA website and as a result the website has undergone vast improvement and many changes. Initially, members had problems using the new website but things now seem to be going well as the website has been very active and is a good source of information for our members.

The ACA website is one of the ACA's main source of communication. In addition to thanking Mike Sekuloff for his work on the website, thanks go to everyone who updated the tournament schedules and wrote reports on the website. Also currently the ACA pays the costs for websites of some chess clubs in Alberta.

9. The current financial status of the ACA is not known but overall, I believe that the ACA is still in good shape. I apologize for the lack of financial information, as this year, the ACA treasurer decided to take a passive approach which was limited to signing cheques. The Treasurer was waiting for the services of an accountant as earlier this year, the ACA Board, at the Planning Meeting, decided that the ACA should hire an accountant. This has not yet been done (a request has been recently sent in to AGLC). If AGLC approval is not given, the ACA will use general revenue funds. The 2006 Financial Statement remains to be done.

At the end of last year, and onto earlier this year, the ACA had problems getting the 2005 Financial Statement finalized. This delayed the ACA's 2006 Plan required by ASPRWF and the ACA almost lost getting the final 2006 \$5500 payment from ASRPWF. Thanks to John Quiring for finalizing the books for 2005. The ACA should still have adequate cash on hand as this year (January 9-10) the ACA held a Casino which brought in \$67,779.35 and another Casino is expected late next year. Please extend a thank you to all those members who helped over those two days.

As an added boost, this year Alberta Sport Parks Recreation and Wildlife Foundation increased the ACA's grant to over \$12,285. The ACA thanks the ASPRWF for their continued support. The ACA is one of the few organizations in Alberta to receive government fund-

ing. To get this support requires a certain amount of paperwork and meetings.

10. This year, the ACA did not need to pay room rental support to the Calgary Chess Club as they successfully hosted their own Casino and are on their way to self sufficiency. However in its

place the ACA will be paying for room rental costs of the Grande Prairie Chess Club at a far greater cost than in previous years.

- 11. Other things in the ACA this year are as follows:
- The ACA now pays the rating fees for everything, including juniors (chess N math)
- The ACA provided a new computer to the Calgary Junior Chess Club
- The ACA is seeking the services of a new Full Time Administrator to help with Administration, etc. This is a new program offered by ASPRPWF where monies are available to pay the salaries for an administrator for three years. The ACA currently has a request to ASRPWF for an administrator which could pay upwards of \$40,000 per year. If approved, this position could be used to help with the tremendous amount of paperwork which needs to be done in a given year. Late news: The ACA has been granted \$50,000 per year for an administrator by ASRPWF.
- In 2008, Alberta will be hosting the Canadian Chess Challenge National Finals and the ACA is committed to providing major funding for the event.
- 12. This year, a new initiative is underway, which just started in

September to solidify memberships. Organizers and clubs throughout Alberta are being asked by the ACA (through Bruce Thomas) to formally sell ACA memberships (this is not CFC/ACA memberships). Currently the number of ACA "members" is hard to determine. In the past, a member was considered to be anyone who received services from the association. Now, ASRPWF considers a member to be anyone who has paid a fee of some type. ASRPWF considers number of members to be a big factor in determining the

funding eligibility given to an association. Hence, the ACA has taken the initiative to collect a membership fee (albeit a token value) from everyone. Forms have been designed to collect the membership information. The ACA hopes that the various organizers and clubs will

cooperate by selling memberships on behalf of the ACA. This is not meant to be a money grab as the ACA is willing to return the funds collected either directly or indirectly.

13. Lastly, I would like to congratulate the South on their victory in the Battle of Alberta. Kudos to the members of the South team and to their arch rivals from the North...

As mentioned earlier, it seems like there is only a handful of people keeping the ACA running. Micah Hughey and Vlad Rekhson in Edmonton, Tim Pradzinski in Grande Prairie and Jim Daniluk in Calgary. Bruce Thomas is instrumental in getting our junior chess programs underway. A great big thank you goes to these people and to all those people who stepped forward to help TD tournaments etc and to the members of the Board of Directors.

Lastly, as President, I would like to apologize for my general lack of activity (visibility) at ACA tournaments. There always seems to be paperwork which deprives me of time to play chess and to see what is happening. I do manage to play in two out of town tournaments each year.

Anyone who has a strong interest in helping organize chess in Alberta, I encourage you to get on the ACA Board of Directors. *Thank you.*

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
