A shorthand method of recording chess positions is the Forsythe Notation. The board is listed from White's side; Black pieces are lower case, White upper case. Begin with the 8th rank; put a '/' after each rank. An example is: rlblrlk1/5pp1/p2p4/2p2P2/2OpP q2/8/PPP2B2/1K2R2R (Numbers give empty squares). White to move. This is the position mentioned on the last page.

Between the end of September and the 3rd of November the Calgary CC held its annual Championship Tournament. This year 60 players started out in what turned out to be a very strong tournament. It was a 6 round Swiss, with the first two rounds by accelerated pairings. Clear first (as expected) was A. Zaradic (5½-½), followed at 5-1 by P. Allan (= Top A), A. Zissos (Top Junior) and B. Szucs (= Top A). R. Pedersen, D. Wyllie and T. Patten tied for Top B, and K. Wilson, P. Usselman and R. Hawkes for Top C. J. Weitman was Top D, while the Top Unrated was D. Mulligan. Report by J. Rick Douziech has locked up first in B, an 11-man round-robin (originally 12, but, to the surprize of no one, Ali quit). Reports and games from these two sections will be in the next ACR.

Section C, a 40 player Swiss, did finish, and the final crosstable is in the next column. Tim Dean took first with $8\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$, with Stanley Mah right behind, clear second, with 8-2. Harvey King was the Tournament Director.

After being slaughtered by the Soviets, we got going again for 1 round. We defeated Scotland 3-1 with only a few problems. I give my game against Swanson here, partly because it is the only one I have, and partly because I've never before seen a Queen so awkwardly placed as Swanson's was at move 32.

Ne2 (Forced. After 10. Ngf3 Ne4, 11. Ne4 --11. Bg7?? Nc3+ wins the Q-- Bc3+, 12. bc f5, and Black gets the piece back with the better ending.), 10. ... Nh5, 11. 0-0 Bg4, 12. f3 Be6, 13. f4 Bg4 (Black probably should have tried developing his rooks, rather than indulging in this lengthy manoeuvre with the bishop, only to exchange it for a knight. In this case the bishop should have retreated to d7, not e6, followed by f5 and Rae8.), 14. Bg7 Kg7?!, 15. Nf3 Qf6 (Much better is Rae8. Now, the knight on h5 has nowhere to go.), 16. Qd2 Bf3, 17. Rf3 Nd4, 18. Rf2 Kg8, 19. Nc3 Qd8 (White obviously has the superior position, with more space and better development.), 20. g4 Nf6, 21. h3 Nd7, 22. Raf1 Qh4, 23. Qe3 c5, 24. The 28th of July was our first rest day. We were all loaded onto buses and shipped out to the remains of a major Aztec city: Teotihuacan. We spent the day climbing through the ruins, and bargaining for trinkets at the small market nearby.

The final round of the preliminaries saw us playing Brazil. We expected Germany to defeat Scotland by at least $2\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ (and the early stages of the games indicated the score would probably be $3\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$). Thus, if we were to get into the A final, we would need a score of at least 3-1 against Brazil. This would drop Brazil into 4th place. Nurmi defeated Sunye on board 1 (see ACR, vol. 2, #4, for the gamescore), but Baragar, Taylor and Stone all lost.

As I recall, Taylor sacrificed a pawn to gain several tempi, but Black's position was too solid and never appeared to be in serious danger. Stone reached a lost adjournment, and was not able to hold the position when it was resumed.

What was really disappointing was the fact that Germany finished with a 2-2 split against Scotland. Thus, all we needed was 2-2 against Brazil. Had Baragar and Taylor played a bit more cautiously, we might have managed to get that score.

It was a very demoralized Canadian team that faced Wales in the first round of the B-final. We actually lost the match $2\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$. Taylor won a piece (and the game), Buchholz drew quickly. I managed to lose a drawn endgame, and Nurmi just didn't play very well.

Meanwhile, the Soviet machine started off the A-final with a 4-0 score against Germany. (Why couldn't they have done that in the preliminaries?!!) Romanishin made no mistake against Wockenfuss this time.

Nurmi drew on Board 1, Baragar won on Board 2 (at last!!), Ray Stone slaughtered his opponent, but Buchholz was unable to hold on, and finally gave up the ghost on move 77.
