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**Information on the
1984 Alberta Closed**

The winner of the 1984 Alberta Closed will qualify for the 1984 Canadian Closed. The 1984 Alberta Closed will be held April 20-21-22 in Edmonton.

The 6 players in the Closed are chosen as follows:

(1) The previous year's Alberta Closed winner (Rob Hawkes).

(2) The highest placed Albertan in the 1983 Alberta Open (Rob South).

(3) The winner of the 1984 Edmonton Closed.

(4) The winner of the 1984 Calgary Closed.

(5 & 6) The top rated players not previously qualified.

In the event that one person wins more than one of the first 4 spots or a person qualified via one of those spots declines to play, the additional entry or entries will be filled from the rating list.

All participants must have played in sufficient Alberta CFC rated tournaments to acquire 2 participation points. All CFC rated tournaments held in Alberta are worth at least 1/2 point, while the following events are worth 1 participation point: Alberta Open, Edmonton Closed, Calgary Closed, Alberta Over 1800, Northern Alberta Open, Southern Alberta Open.

Participation points must be earned during the period of April 1, 1983 to April 1, 1984. For the purpose of determining the qualifiers by rating, the last published rating (in either *En Passant* or *The Northern* as of March 31, 1984) will be used.

It is incumbent upon all players hoping to qualify for the Alberta Closed to ensure that they meet the above rules.

"Rapid transit" tournaments have a time control of 20 min. per player and will probably be Swisses. Entry fee is \$2 for members (membership is \$5 for a nonuniversity player, but is half-price for out of town players).

The entry fee for the "Valentine" tournament will be \$3 and for the "Spring" tournament \$4. At the latter event, to celebrate the end of the university year, refreshments of sorts will be on hand. Time control for these two tournaments has yet to be decided.

1983 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

Revised Bylaws

The revised bylaws were approved at the Annual General Meeting (AGM; Edmonton, Oct. 10, 1983). Anyone wishing more info should contact the ACA.

Tracy Kolenchuk, who was then the ACA President, gave his report at the AGM:

President's Report

Chess in Alberta is in good shape.

The latest issue of the ACR listed 13 chess clubs in Alberta. We missed some (I made up the list and left out those that were "less than certain" clubs). This is because of work that other people (other than the ACA Executive) are doing in the province. Red Deer, for example, held its largest tournament in many years, the Alberta Over/Under 1800 Championships -- there were 39 players.

The ACA Executive has been working as well.

Last year we sent "care packages" to most of the clubs listed in the latest ACR. We are currently making up to those we missed.

The ACA now has ACA T-shirts for sale -- walking advertisements for your Association.

We have an Annual Plan -- prepared by myself, Len Steele, Bruce Thomas and David Johansen -- that contains a list of 28 projects the ACA attempted (or has yet to attempt) this year. The Alberta Open Championship is one example. Twenty of these projects can already be considered a success. A few more have been added to the original plan.

We have a new set of Bylaws to vote on today (as indicated above, they were approved at the AGM). They were prepared according to guidelines from the provincial government for recreational associations.

We have a grant this year from the government for \$12,400. There are some strings attached (as usual): (a) we must raise an additional \$8,200 and spend a total of \$20,600 to use the entire grant; (b) the total must be divided equally (25% each) in 4 areas (Administration, Leadership Development, Program Development, "As we see fit").

Last year's financial statement shows that we raised \$7,400 and spent only \$13,000 -- and as a result returned \$3,500 to the government. This year we should not have to return any money.

We have a handout that can be sold or given away: an "Introduction to Chess". The price of printing was less than 50 cents per copy, so we are able to give a large number to schools without significant loss.

We produce, and will continue to produce, TD Kits -- which contain all paper supplies needed for a 5-round, 20-player Swiss tournament. These kits also contain some leadership materials for new tournament directors.

We have a new ACA/CFC membership form available to organizers. It has a "built in" membership card.

What don't we have? There are some problems in the ACA that need to be addressed: (1) We have no clubs south of Calgary (Roy Yearwood is attempting to do some work in this area); (2) The Edmonton Chess Club and the Edmonton Junior Chess Club are both suffering from a shortage of workers (this may well be true for all clubs); (3) The Government's Corporate Registry computer is trying to dissolve our Association (for "sins of omission"); (4) We currently have an equipment shortage (I gave it all away to clubs); (5) We have very few people (only Bruce Thomas and Roy Yearwood) who have agreed to go OUTSIDE the cities and perform leadership activities; (6) The membership list needs updating (my fault, I'm also membership director).

But we are in good shape. Next year should be even better.

ACA Past President's Notes

Well, I know I can't be President forever, but I would like to take some final "kicks at the cat" before I shut up and "fade into the woodwork".

First of all, I would like to acknowledge the assistance given by the past Executive. I am very grateful to all, and I think it appropriate to list here some of the accomplishments of some of these people (for those of you who might not know). I have deliberately not tried to give any order to this, so please don't feel slighted if your name did not come first.

David Johansen, as Treasurer, put in innumerable hours counting our money (and adding up my phone bills -- because I never got them right). If you don't think this is a lot of work, you should look over the books he keeps. Because we have to keep very thorough records for the government, classified into the three magic groups, David's work is essential.

Sylvia Huber runs the Calgary Junior Chess Club. The ACA would be nowhere without its junior players (who grow up to be senior players). Sylvia works hard for our good name in the schools in Calgary -- the kind of work that doesn't make the ACR very often, but sure makes it for the kids. (P.S. I've never called Sylvia when she wasn't in a great mood. I don't know how she does it.)

Bruce Thomas has given his advice on innumerable occasions (I'm not saying I always followed it). Actually, Bruce does some other work that may be less known to the Executive -- but was very well known to me as membership director. He gets new members. In Slave Lake, Wabasca, Grande Prairie, Gift Lake, and on and on and on ... Bruce keeps working and the memberships keep rolling in. He is a large part of the reason we have more non-city clubs north of Edmonton than in any other part of the province.

Darse Billings works in Calgary for at least two clubs (U of Calgary, Calgary Junior Club). In the past year he directed the Canadian Cadet Championship, the Alberta Closed Championship, the Calgary School Team Championship, and God only

knows what else. He had help (usually from Sylvia Huber and/or Roy Yearwood), but Darse was often the moving force.

Carol Miyagawa does not want the world to know that she single handedly ran the Edmonton Junior Chess Club for the last two years (or more), but I'm saying it now only because she doesn't want to continue doing it all by herself. Carol always seems to be involved in other things (other than chess) as well -- I wonder how she finds time for it all. Her work as Secretary of the ACA was only a small part of her work for the ACA.

Roy Yearwood is a worker. He does some tournaments on his own -- but a lot of the work he does for the ACA is in the background. Lugging stuff to someone else's tournament. Being there, willing to help. Roy also served, and will continue to serve, by holding and giving out TD kits in the southern half of the province. We also hope to put Roy to work south of Calgary -- where leaders are desperately needed. He has consented to work in Medicine Hat, where we have had some requests for help.

John Schleinich sits in his office in Toronto and "complains" that we were sending all of his mail to Ottawa (true, but it did get to him eventually). He comes back to Calgary every once in a while to help out the Calgary Chess Club. The latest from John is that he will retire in December -- and only work for chess after that. We need him. John has served the ACA for many years and will no doubt continue to do so. He was one of the few people on the Executive who read the new Bylaws and made some very good comments (actually, one of his comments was "you'll never get it done" ... you lost that bet, John). I spent a few hours drinking coffee in John's house in Calgary -- and learned a lot about chess in Alberta. Every ACA President should make a point of following this tradition.

Bill Rusk served quietly in the Calgary Chess Club. Because I live so far away from him, I couldn't see his work, but I know it got done. John might want to "take over" chess in Calgary when he gets back -- but he'll need Bill to help.

Other members of the Executive (Jan Greben, Alan Aycock, Branimir Brebrich) served mostly in an advisory capacity. Jan devoted a lot of his time to the Edmonton Chess Club, and represented that club on our Executive. Alan Aycock found his other work (I believe he has been appointed Assistant Dean) taking a lot of his time, and could not give as much as he would have liked. Branimir Brebrich supplied an interesting history of the ACA for all of the Executive present at one of our meetings. I always wondered how the ACA started. If you do too, ask Branimir for one version.

There are a few people who were not members of the Executive, but whose contribution should be noted. Ian Loadman and Len Steele put in a lot of hours to get the ACR out regularly. George Wilkinson continued his faithful task as the Edmonton Chess Club treasurer -- where would the ECC be without him?

Many of these people will continue to work for the ACA in the future. Their past work sets an example that new Executive members will find hard to keep up. THANK YOU.

I also want to wish the new Executive all the best in their terms. Work hard -- and make Alberta a better place for chess.

Awit (also known as Wita) finished equal second in the 4th World Computer Chess Championship, held October 22-25 in New York. The tournament, a 5 round Swiss, was won by Cray Blitz, with 4.5. Awit scored 4 to tie with Bebe. The surprise of the tournament (aside from Awit, of course) was the poor showing of defending champion Belle, which lost to Cray Blitz and Nuchess. Awit was programmed by Dr. Tony Marsland of the University of Alberta, Edmonton.

The 1983 Alberta Open was held on Thanksgiving weekend, October 8, 9 and 10, in the General Services Building on the University of Alberta Campus, Edmonton. The Alberta Open is traditionally Alberta's most prestigious and important open Swiss system tournament. This year's event was doubly important as the winner would qualify for the 1984 Alberta Closed, which in turn is a qualifier for the 1984 Canadian Closed and World Championship Zonal. Despite its importance, the tournament could hardly be called an unqualified success. The total number of entrants was only 38 -- while this is not out of line with the past couple of Alberta Opens, I had hoped for more. Last spring's Northern Alberta Open had drawn 50, and the recent Over/Under 1800 in Red Deer a total of 39. The Alberta Open, drawing upon the much larger pool of Edmonton players, should have been bigger than the 1800. Unfortunately, organizational problems prevented the publication of a full advertisement in the last ACR and delayed the mailing of a flyer until barely a week before the event. An unfortunate typo resulted in the flyers actually advertising the "Albert Open". I was unaware of this typo until it was pointed out to me during the tournament, and spent a good deal of Saturday morning wondering why people kept asking me who Albert was. Organizers should note that advertising makes a tournament and attempt to avoid the above mistakes.

The other disappointment of the tournament was the low number of Edmontonians playing. Of the 38 players, 13 were from Calgary, 9 from outside of Edmonton or Calgary and only 16 from Edmonton. In other words, at an Edmonton tournament non-Edmonton players outnumbered the residents 22 to 16. Especially absent were players rated under 1600. The ACA would welcome any speculation on where the players have gone and how to get them back.

There were a number of positive things about the tournament -- for one, it was very strong. The first round found the top four boards all occupied by masters. Alex Kuznecov, presently Canada's highest rated junior and the winner of the recent Alberta Over 1800, was top ranked. Jan Greben, also rated over 2300, held down second board, while third board went to Dave Ross, a recent arrival from Ottawa. Dave has previously lived in Alberta and was a participant in the 1980 Alberta Closed. Rounding out the masters and sporting a new FIDE Master title was four-time Alberta Closed Champion Rob Hawkes. In all, 13 players rated over 1900 took part.

Most of the top players survived the first two rounds with their perfect scores intact, although Neil Sharp and Alan Aycocok were nicked for draws by Branko Palcic and Joseph Ciz, respectively. Round 3 saw the first encounters between the top players. There were 8 perfect scores and the pairings put Rob South against Kuznecov on the top board. At the Over 1800 two weeks previously Kuznecov had beaten South in a crucial last round game, but this time it was South who had the pressure with Kuznecov short of time. Kuznecov, however, defended very solidly and a draw was agreed shortly after the time control. On second board Greben was very fortunate to beat Zissos, who lost on time one move from the time control in a position where he held the advantage. Dave Ross may have stood marginally worse against Mueller at one point, but gradually outplayed him and won a long ending. Apostolis Berberakis was the surprise player with 2 points, having upset Patrick Wharton, the Under 1800 champion, in round 2, but he ran into Hawkes in round 3 and was demolished. The fourth round didn't sort out the situation at the top, as Ross and Greben drew to reach a score of 3.5-.5. Ross felt he missed a win in the double rook ending (see games section). The draw on board 1 allowed Kuznecov and South to move up into a first place tie. Kuznecov defeated Hawkes, who sacrificed unsoundly, and South managed to overcome Neil Sharp's resistance in a long endgame. On fourth board Zissos defeated John Baser, who had moved up to the top boards with a third round upset of Aycocok. Zissos' Closed Sicilian simply kept absorbing more space on the Kingside until a decisive breakthrough appeared. Meanwhile on board 12 Bob Bosenius beat Joseph Ciz in a game which may not have seemed too important at the time, but more was to be heard from both of them next day.

The two eventual winners emerged as co-leaders in the fifth round. Ross defeated Kuznecov on board 1. Kuznecov got a bad opening, but defended very well and was getting over his problems when he blundered (see games section). On board 2 Rob South won quickly, with black, against Greben. Greben's Kingside play never looked adequate against South's central play against the d-pawn (see games). This left Ross and South with 4.5 each. Hawkes beat Roy Yearwood and Zissos defeated Tracy Kolenchuk to stand on 4-1 ahead of a large group of players with 3.5.

The final round was something of an anticlimax as South and Ross drew quickly to finish with 5-1 scores and tied for first. Only Hawkes or Zissos could move up to share first, but the higher rated Hawkes was unable to make any impression on Zissos' solid play with white. This left both Zissos and Hawkes with 4.5, where they were joined by Kuznecov, who beat Mueller, and Greben, who beat James Flemming. Rob South won the tiebreak over Ross and so joins Rob Hawkes (the 1983 Alberta Closed Champion) as qualifiers for the 1984 Closed.

Zissos' 4.5-1.5 was good enough for Top A, while Dusan Cokleski took advantage of Yearwood's attempts to win in an even position to post a last round win and a 4-2 score for Second A. Edmonton junior Bob Bosenius had a fine result, losing only to South, enroute to a 4-2 score and Top B. Second B was shared by Bruno Knudskov, Graham Cooper and Graham Barnes. Joseph Ciz was Top Under 1600 with 3, followed by Kurt Lauterwald with 2.5.

The 1983 Alberta Junior was held on October 15 and 16 at the Music Room of the Centennial Library in Edmonton. This year's event was an 8-player, 5-round Swiss. Past Juniors have always been round robins and this would seem to be the preferable type of tournament, for in a Swiss with a high rounds to players ratio pairings in the final rounds can be very peculiar. Fortunately, this did not turn out to be a major problem as top-rated Rob Gardner left no doubt as to who the top junior was with a 4.5-.5 score to win by a full point over second place Terry Gannon.

Gardner, the 1981 Champion, and Gannon, last year's winner, had to be rated as the pretournament favorites. Along with Lorne Rusnell and Bob Bosenius they made up the 4-man Edmonton contingent and were the top four by rating. It is a peculiar fact about the Alberta Junior that almost always one city (Calgary or Edmonton) dominates. For the past couple of years Edmonton has had the top juniors in the province, but before that was the Zissos-Hawkes era when all the top juniors were Calgarians. Perhaps it is the presence of stiff competition from other juniors that spurs greater development and leads to good players showing up in bunches. The rest of this year's field was made up of Chris Demers and Rob Woods of Calgary, Karen Mah from Slave Lake, and John Trenson of Rimbey. Karen's participation was noteworthy, not only was she the first girl to take part in an Alberta Junior, but she was also one of the youngest contestants ever.

All the higher rated players won in round 1, but in round 2 Gannon drew with Rusnell. Gardner, playing Black in a King's Indian Samisch against Bosenius, got a very bad opening and was under pressure throughout the middle game. Bosenius didn't make much of his edge, but simplified to a knight and rook ending where he was certainly no worse than equal. Fortunately for Gardner, however, Bosenius played the endgame poorly, trading first the rooks and then the knights, repairing Gardner's pawn structure in the process. The game was adjourned in a King and pawn endgame that was easily won for Gardner and the second session lasted only a few moves. This game typifies Gardner's style, which is perhaps atypical of juniors. His openings are often just short of horrible, but he plays well in difficult positions and in positional sense was far ahead of his rivals.

The third round saw Gardner stretch his lead to a full point as he defeated Rusnell in a nice game which is included with this report. Gardner exploited the superior mobility of his major pieces by switching pressure from Rusnell's weak a-pawn to the Kingside and produced a mating finish. Meanwhile, Gannon and Bosenius drew a short game on which they both spent a great deal of time. Gannon, especially, was susceptible to time trouble, and typically arrived at move 20 with only 10 or 15 minutes remaining on his clock.

Gannon and Gardner met in the 4th round and, as Gardner led by a full point, a victory was essential for Gannon. Abandoning his usual solid

style, Gannon played the King's Gambit and sacrificed a piece for three pawns (see games). However, Gardner defended with his usual aplomb, and with the onset of time trouble and believing his position to be lost, Gannon offered a draw, which was accepted. Gardner won his final round game against Mah to qualify for the Canadian Junior and win the first prize, return airfare to that event. Gannon, in second, and Rusnell and Bosenius, who shared third, won book prizes.

The 1983 Alberta Junior was organized by Carol Miyagawa under the auspices of the Edmonton Junior Chess Club.
