



#### More about the ACA

The Alberta Chess Association became a Registered Society under the Societies Act on December 13, 1970. The objects of the ACA, as set out in the original application, are: 1979 Al

- 1. To administer, coordinate and foster chess activities in Alberta.
  - 2. To give guidance to any group wishing to form a chess club and to help maintain existing clubs.
  - 3. To represent the Alberta chess community to the CFC, local government, and other chess associations in matters dealing with the planning and directing of tournaments, exhibitions and matches.
  - 4. To promote, arrange and hold any and all kinds of amateur chess contests, exhibitions and competitions, and to contribute towards and provide for the awarding of prizes and trophies therein.
  - 5. To promote and afford opportunity for friendly and social activities.
  - 6. To sell, manage, lease, mortgage, dispose of, or otherwise deal with the property of the conjects. society.
  - 7. To operate branches and associate or affiliate with other societies with similar objects.
  - 8. To generally do all things that may appear necessary and useful in accomplishing the purposes hereinabove set out.

Perhaps the most important single service the ACA now offers its members is the Alberta Chess Report. We feel that the only way to keep our organization strong and thriving (and growing!) is to keep the members informed of what has happened, what is happening, and what will happen with respect to aspects of chess of interest to Albertans. We strive to report fully on Alberta tournaments, including game scores, hopefully annotated, wherever possible. Another important aspect is to let players know what events are coming up so that they may arrange their schedule to partake in our many tournaments.

The ACA is committed to holding the Alberta Open and the Alberta Closed each year, as well as the Southern and Northern Alberta Open tournaments. Furthermore, the Calgary and Edmonton Chess Clubs, operating as branches of the ACA (ACA membership is required of all club members; the Black Knight Chess Club also requires this), regularly hold the Open and Closed Championships of their respective cities. Funds are provided to assist the running of some tournaments. Naturally, the ACA is vitally interested in promoting the staging of many events, be they regular tournaments or "one shot" affairs, workshops, simultaneous displays, beginners tournaments, etc. Furthermore, the ACA often provides personnel, chess boards, scoresheets, demo boards, sets, clocks, etc.

The distribution of "active" chess players in the province (see page 5) has resulted in most of the activity occurring in Calgary and Edmonton. That is only natural. However, we are not ignoring other areas! It is true that what we really need is active organizers in all regions of the province. In an attempt to arouse interest in other parts of Alberta, the ACA will probably be operating a regional tournament program in 1979-1980 wherein we will organize tournaments in smaller centers (hopefully with the active assistance of some local players); securing a playing site, advertising locally and in the ACR, and providing equipment and a director. We also should be able to get \$50 per toutnament through

participation in the ACA. A higher on the part of the ACA will make us more broader profile visible to the public in general. This should result in an increase in the number of members and a rise in the activity level of chess in

ACA receives a large portion of its funding from the Government of Alberta, with the rest of our operating capital coming from membership dues, etc. The Government does not just give the money to us without some strings attached, and their regulations are now becoming tighter. Basically, if the ACA (or any organization funded by the Government) does not perform up to certain standards and within a set of guidelines, the funds could be reduced or, perish the thought, cut off. So, we are not only dedicated to furthering Alberta chess, but we have to!

One thing the Alberta Government does insist on for 1980 is that the ACA and TAYCA (The Alberta Youth Chess Association) must present a joint application for funding in the future. This will necessitate some form of association between the two organizations (though, of course, each could operate in its "own" area as in the past -- TAYCA being mostly concerned with juniors, and the ACA operating more at the club and rated tournament level, with no age restrictions). There has been a fair bit of friction between our two organizations, but it does appear that we are now rather more potentially compatible than ever before. Since there must be some sort of ACA-TAYCA cooperation, here is something about TAYCA itself for your information:

### THE ALBERTA YOUTH CHESS ASSOCIATION

objects of TAYCA, as set out in their Societies Act application dated February 4, 1975, are: 3 os

- 1. To organize, sponsor, conduct, and promote programmes and activities related to the play of chess by young persons in the Province of Alberta, including (without restricting the generality of the foregoing) workshops, tournaments, matches, exhibitions, courses of instruction, and the publicizing through the media of such activities as aforesaid.
- 2. To provide, operate, and maintain facilities for the play of chess for the use of young persons in the Province of Alberta.
- 3. To establish a library and reading room.
- Generally to encourage and foster and develop among its members and the public a recognition of the importance of the play of chess as a recreational activity.
- r. To sell, manage, lease, mortgage, dispose of, or otherwise deal with the property of the society.

The operations of the society are to be chiefly carried on in all parts of the Province of Alberta where the society considers it expedient and convenient to do so. Until the present, TAYCA has operated almost exclusively in Calgary, but it is hoped (and expected) that the new Executive will be widening their affairs considerably, particularly into Edmonton. TAYCA and the ACA have an agreement with respect to the operation of the Alberta Junior Closed (scheduled for the

By this means we would hope to get even this agreement involves the holding of Edmonton and Calgary Junior Closed tournaments shortly in order to qualify some entrants for the Alberta Junior Closed. # CHESS FEDERATION OF CANADA

Those of you who are already CFC members will have received the 1979 CFC Yearbook which contains a lot of information about the CFC (with a general description on pages 20-21). We will not reproduce all the details here. New members of the CFC will also get the Yearbook.

Membership in the CFC is required for all those who wish to play in rated tournaments. Alberta CFC members must also be ACA members. CFC dues for Albertans, including ACA dues, are:

#### Senior -- \$13 Junior (under 18) -- \$3

CFC memberships are valid one year from date of purchase. Along with your membership you will receive the bimonthly publication "Chess Canada Echecs". This magazine is produced by Jon Berry, CFC Business Manager, and it would be well worth your while to join the CFC just to receive it! It is quite a good chess magazine, chock full of lots of interesting games, reports from all across the ccuntry and elsewhere, general information, etc. Furthermore, CFC members have access to a large stock of books and equipment, with a special <u>discount</u> to <u>members</u>, and good service. Why not join if you are not yet a member or your membership should be renewed? Send your dues to us, join at your local club, or write directly to the CFC (Box 7339, Ottawa, Ontario K1L 8E4) .

Juniors who wish to get a "participating CFC membership" (includes CFC Yearbook; can play in rated events; no CFC magazine, but you get the ACR), can join for \$5. Family memberships (same family, same address, bought at the same time) in the CFC can be purchased (first membership at the adult rate, the rest \$5 each plus half-ACA dues; one magazine per household).

# CANADIAN CORRESPONDENCE CHESS ASSOCIATION

Ever wanted to try your hand at postal chess? If so, we have an organization right here in Canada which invites you to join (yearly dues are \$8 senior, \$6 junior; includes bimonthly magazine). The CCCA currently has over 600 members. You can play in both class and open postal tournaments within Canada, and there is also an international program. # CHESS FOUNDATION OF CANADA

The Foundation administers and invests a fund of money which has evolved through sale of CFC Life Memberships (see CFC Yearbook, p. 17), donations, etc. The interest is given annually to the Chess Federation of Canada to support country-wide chess activities. Since the Federal Government obstinately refuses to recognize the value of chess, the CFC must go hat-in-hand to its members for financial help in sending our team to the 1980 Olympiad. The total for last year's Olympiad venture was cost \$10,312.03, and 1980 will probably require a like amount. Won't you consider making a donation, no matter how small? Clubs are invited to hold events wherein a "cut" of the entry fees goes to this Fund, and they might consider making a donation from their general revenues. Stronger players might consider holding simultaneous displays and forward the "profit" to the Olympiad Fund. ### HELLO TOURNAMENT DIRECTORS AND ORGANIZERS

We would like to announce your tournaments in the ACP! Please send us full details far enough in advance for publication.

Please check to see that all entrants in your rated tournaments possess <u>current ACA and CFC</u> <u>memberships</u>. A list of ACA members is available on request to directors and organizers.

PLEASE send a copy of the <u>final crosstable</u> of your tournament to us for publication in the ACR (in tiebreak order, if possible). A <u>written report</u> plus <u>qame scores</u> would be a definite asset. The <u>quality</u> of our report on your tournament depends very much on what you send us.

### CLOSEL CHAMPIONSHIP PARTICIPATION RULES

All entrants in the Alberta Closed and the Alberta Junior Closed must have at least 2 "participation points" in the year prior to each Closed (normally since the previous Closed). The following tournaments are worth 1 participation point each: Alberta Open, Northern Alberta Open, Southern Alberta Open, Calgary and Edmonton Championships (run at the city clubs), plus any other major tournaments that may be put in this category (e.g., the 1979 Canadian Open). All other Alberta tournaments are worth one-half a participation point each if they are CFC rated tournaments (matches do not count). Participation points are not given to dropouts. Note: juniors may also get participation points through TAYCA tournaments (the value of most is less than one-half point). TAYCA members should consult that organization for further details (address in an earlier section).

### SO YOU'RE GOING TO WITHDRAW?

If, during a tournament, you wish to withdraw,

then <u>PLFASE give notice</u> as soon as possible. The Tournament Director has to make pairings for the next round, and he needs to know if you will not be coming. It is not a nice thing to have people simply drop out — their scheduled opponent then has to sit around, and, since he entered the tournament to play, he surely is entitled to have someone to play! So, kindly give notice when you must withdraw. The ACA has a rule that dropouts can be charged \$5 before they can enter another ACA event. Please be considerate. Thank you.

## RATING SYSTEM, HOW TOURNAMENTS ARE RUN ...

Well, we could explain it all here, but since you have to be a CFC member to play in a rated tournament, you can consult the CFC Yearbook (given to all CFC members) -- full details have been presented there by Jon Berry. You need only join the CFC, and all the information is yours!

(The USCF, to "express a player's strength more meaningfully" has instituted a new naming system for rating classes. These classes {remember, this is for the US, but may spread someday to Canada} are: Senior Master 2400+; Master 2200-2399; Candidate Master 2000-2199; Expert 1800-1999; Candidate Expert 1600-1799; Advanced 1400-1599; Intermediate 1200-1399; Novice below 1200. With such a system, most of us would feel better when asked our class, or so it seems to me!)

### CORRECTIONS (to the 1979 Canadian Open Report)

A couple of errors in the "Final Tournament Director's Report" on the 1979 Canadian Open (Edmonton, July 7-15) have come to light:

(1) A game score for round 8 showed A. Skeel beating H. King in 10 moves. Mr. King was rather surprised to see this! He did lose to Skeel, but only after a long game and a time scramble. It appears that the game was actually played against a different opponent (presumably in round 7). Mr. Skeel did not know Warvey King by sight, and he seems to have used King's name in error. I regret this blunder in my report, having accepted the game submitted to me as correct, and am happy to set the record straight! I extend my apologies to Mr. King.

(2) Abe Yanofsky (winner of the Canadian Open) wrote to say that he had made a slight error in his annotations to his game with Hawkes in round 4. The note given after move 4 should actually have gone after move 5, with an increase of 1 in each move number. You may wish to correct your copy of the tournament report.

<u>October 31</u>: Club Championship begins (you <u>must</u> <u>have reqistered Oct 24!</u>).

Late October, or November: SOUTHERN ALBERTA OPEN (weekend tournament). More details at a later date.

<u>December 19</u>: Christmas Turkey Shoot! The Clubwill then be closed for the holiday season after tonight.
